Egerton CC v Grafty Green Wanderers – 20th September 2025

The Grafty Green Wanderers were once again back in action at Egerton for their penultimate game of the season. With rainy conditions forecast for the morning, all players were glad to see the inclement weather blow over by the <u>1pm</u> start.

Grafty Green being put to work in the field after losing the toss. On a soft and green wicket, Josh Pankhurst (0 for 43) and Gary Thompson (0 for 46) opened the bowling. The Egerton batsman playing and missing whilst dispatching the odd bad ball to the boundary. An opportunity arose in the fifth over when Pankhurst nicked off the opening batsman. Stand in keeper Jack Gearey (replacing a holidaying Niall McNulty) unable to cling on to the ball. After 10 overs, Egerton CC were on 56 with no loss. Paul Stapley, on at first change, pinned down the Egerton batsmen with line and length medium pace bowling resulting in the first breakthrough and Jack Gearey, not making the same mistake, catching one behind the stumps. Clarry McCague also bowled well from the other end supporting Paul Stapley to build pressure which lead to another caught behind from Paul's pin-point accuracy with the ball. After 20 overs Egerton CC were 115 for 2 – at 6 runs per over it felt par for the course. Previous games had only last 20 overs, so match fitness was to be questioned in the final 10 overs.

The last 10 overs swung in favour of each team, James Iles taking some heat from the Egerton batsmen and ultimately returning figures of 2 for 47. Some hard hitting in the final overs against specialist death bowler Clarry McCague (0 for 36) meant Egerton CC finished on 195 for 4 after 30 overs. The pick of the bowlers for Grafty Green Wanderers being Paul Stapley; 6 over, 18 runs for 2 wickets.

The Egerton CC bowlers used the new ball to great effect; a combination of speed and swing pinned down the Grafty Green batsmen. Jack Gearey opening managed to cream the ball at the cover fielder and Jack left the field being caught for 6 runs. David Ryan, wearing a significant amount of body protection and worried about the climbing ball from the Egerton opening bowlers departed the field for a duck. Clarry McCague steadied the ship however a middle order collapse left Grafty Green on 29 for 6 after 11 overs.

Some resistance by Josh Pankhurst was cut short when he was bowled for 11. Nick Eastwood managed to partner Clarry as he went on to score 50 runs and retire out. James Iles joined Nick Eastwood at the crease and carried on from where Clarry had left off. By this point the comeback was on and after 20 overs Grafty Green found themselves on 107 for 7. After James Iles retired on 50 Steve Legon managed a few runs before succumbing to the Egerton bowlers and with Nick Eastwood being caught out it was back to Clarry McCague and James Iles to reenter and bring the victory back home. With 50 runs required off 30 balls, it was a tough ask. 32 runs required off 12 balls and then 16 off 6 meant game on.

Unfortunately, it wasn't to be. The first ball of the last over finding it's way down Long On's throat meant Grafty Green Wanderers coming up 16 runs short.

Our thanks go to Egerton CC for hosting us along with Carol scoring on our behalf and the Grafty Green Growlers for all their support on the day.

Electrical Rewire

I am pleased to report that the village hall reopened after refurbishment on time on the 1st September and at the time of writing we are working on a few minor snagging issues which by the time you read this article should have been resolved. 

The Grafty Gourmet

This seasonal recipe makes for a great starter or is great for lunch. Serves 6.

Blue Cheese, Pear & Walnut Tart

For the filling:-

For the pastry:50g of walnut halves
150g of plain flour
80g of cold unsalted butter (chopped)
1 egg yolk

1 tablespoon of butter
1 tablespoon of olive oil (plus an extra 1-2 teaspoons)
4 shallots sliced into half-moons small bunch of sage - finely chopped
200g chard stalks finely chopped and leaves roughly chopped
2 pears - halved, cored and sliced
3 large eggs
grating of nutmeg
150g of crème fraîche
150g of gorgonzola dolce (or vegetarian alternative), torn into bite-sized pieces
50g of walnut halves

- 1. To make the pastry, blitz the walnuts in a <u>food processor</u> until they resemble breadcrumbs. Add the flour and a large pinch of salt. Pulse briefly to combine, then add the butter and pulse until it resembles large crumbs. Add the egg yolk and pulse until the dough comes together (add 1 tablespoon of cold water if it seems dry). Squash the dough into a disc, then wrap in baking parchment and chill for at least 30 mins.
- 2. Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan. Heat the butter and 1 tablespoon of oil in a heavy-based frying pan or skillet over a medium heat, and cook the shallots, sage and chard stalks for 5-8 mins until soft and starting to caramelise. Add the chard leaves and continue to cook until wilted, then remove from the heat.
- 3. Put the chilled pastry between two sheets of baking parchment and <u>roll out</u> to the thickness of a £1 coin. Use it to line a 20cm tart tin, then chill for 30 mins until firm. Toss the pear slices in 1-2 teaspoons of oil on a baking sheet.
- 4. Scrunch up another sheet of baking parchment and use it to line the pastry case, then fill with baking beans. Bake for 15 mins, alongside the pears. Remove both from the oven. Remove the parchment and beans from the pastry case, then bake for 8-10 mins more, until the bottom is golden and crisp.
- 5. Lightly beat the eggs in a bowl, then season with some nutmeg and whisk in the crème fraîche. Stir in the blue cheese. Pour half the mixture into the tart case, then layer in two-thirds of the chard mixture. Arrange the roasted pear slices and remaining chard mix on top, then pour over the remaining cheese mix. Place the walnut halves spread evenly on top, then bake for 28-30 mins, or until golden and cooked through. Leave to cool for 20 mins, then slice and serve.

Gardening TipsGardening tips for September

- Keep raking leaves from lawns and paths, store in empty compost bags or in a wire cage to make leaf mould.
- Plant spring bulbs leaving tulips till later in the month, try species tulips in pots, save bulbs for next year.
- Reduce the height of Buddleias shrub roses, and hydrangeas to prevent wind rock.
- Choose a sunny day to cut off sunflower heads collect the seeds for the birds or hang up for the birds to peck.
- This is a good month for dividing perennials before the frosts and for tidying up, leave seed heads for birds and insects to eat through the cold months.

Ivy bees! For the last few weeks there have been a mass of bees, very busy tunnelling into the soil in one of the flower beds, gradually the numbers have increased to thousands and not just in my garden; they have progressed into the lawns which are now covered with mini mounds of soil. Ivy bees are very docile; the males don't sting and the females' sting is weak.

The autumn colours are becoming more obvious and, interestingly, the south side of a tree's leaves change colour first.

I came across a poem by Gerald Manley Hopkins, Inversaid, written in 1881 – the last verse:-

'What would the World be once bereft Of wet and the wilderness? Let them be left O let them be left, wilderness and wet, Long live the weeds and the wilderness yet.'

I was struck that someone was that concerned about the wild spaces as to include it in a poem!







25/09/02 Public Session

The Chairman opened the public session, there were 8 members of the public in attendance, matters brought to the attention of the parish council included

- A number of residents expressed opposition to the possible installation of an in-house parcel locker outside the Village Hall.
 - Concerns raised included issues related to safety, parking, lighting, and increased traffic. The Chairman advised that, at this stage, the proposal was not a matter for the Parish Council, as it was currently being explored by the Village Hall Trustees. The Chairman recommended that residents share their views on the potential installation directly with the Village Hall Trustees when a proposal is raised for consultation. The PC chairman advised that, following a discussion with the village hall chairman, no decisions had been made regarding the parcel locker. Initial enquiries had simply been made with the company to assess whether the Village Hall could be a suitable location in principle. It was confirmed that no final decision would be made without first holding a consultation period with residents.
- Traffic calming measures and Speed watch were also discussed, following concerns raised by
 residents about the speed of vehicles passing through the village. The Chairman agreed to raise the

issue with the KCC Borough Councillor to seek advice on whether any traffic calming measures could be considered or implemented.

A general request was made for residents interested in participating in the Community Speedwatch
initiative. Anyone wishing to volunteer is encouraged to contact either David Jenkins directly or the
Boughton Malherbe Parish Clerk. An advert seeking volunteers will also be published in the
Malherbe Monthly newsletter.

There being no further items for discussion, the Chairman closed the public session at 7:55 pm.

Based on the advice received, it was agreed that no further action is required at this time, and the Parish Council will not proceed with developing a Neighbourhood Plan at this stage. Accordingly, this item will be removed from future agendas but may be revisited if a need arises in the future.

25/09/10 Neighbourhood Plan

The Parish approved the Eyre & Elliston invoice of £164.92 and were made aware that the invoice had already been paid by J Cheney directly and therefore payment would be made to reimburse Mr Cheney directly.

25/09/11 Traffic Calming Measures

This item was discussed during the public session, and it was agreed that the Chairman would speak with the Borough Councillor to seek advice on whether any further traffic calming measures could be considered or implemented.

25/09/12 Local Government Service Pay Award

The Parish Council authorised expenditure of £100 for the purchase of a Remembrance wreath. The Clerk will arrange the purchase.



Christian Message October 2025

On Giving Thanks with a Grateful Heart

My childhood seemed to be full of adults continually telling me that I should be grateful. They may have been right but I got so fed up with the message, I began to hate the word and even resent it. As I became more aware of the world round me, however, I began to realise that I was, indeed, blessed in many ways, and had so much to be thankful about – yet I still avoided the G word!

<u>1 Thessalonians, 5: 18</u>, tells us to 'Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.' All well and good when things are going well, but it's not so easy when you trip over the cat, spill the milk, break a glass bottle and have to spend the morning cleaning the floor. Or isn't it? Part of maturing is seeing the positive in situations. Maybe we should not curse the cat but delight in a clean floor!

Adverse situations can give us a chance to take stock and others to shine. Three years ago this month, I was all set to retire from my main job. Two weeks before my last day, I went upstairs to bed early, feeling a bit unwell, and found it increasingly difficult to use of my left hand and arm. By 1am I was in the stroke unit of the local hospital but thanks to quick thinking medical staff, I was home withing 72 hours.

In the 18 months that followed I had physiotherapy, many tests, a lot of sleep and time to read and think about life. I read frightening statistics about the percentage of people who survive one, two or three years, but was tenacious about exercises and could work, using a keyboard, after three months, and drive after five months. A year later I was grateful to move into the next band of statistics and now, after three years, am thrilled to be enjoying my family, Church life, our local communities, a little work, hobbies and life generally.

'Whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.' Colossians 3:17.

To say I am grateful to the professionals who treated and advised, is an understatement, but I am also grateful to family and friends (many from the Len Valley) who took time to pray, visit, give advice, laugh and joke, drive me from A to B and put up with me not being able to function 'quite right'. Thank you so much. God continues to work miracles through you all.

I am aware that people suffering terminal conditions or who have lost loved ones may find this somewhat simplistic but in dealing with Ankylosing Spondylitis, another, long-term condition, each day, I truly believe that 'The Lord is my strength and my shield'. Psalm 28: 7 goes on to say: 'in him my heart trusts, and I am helped; my heart exults, and with my song I give thanks to him.'

I have to admit that the adults in my childhood were right! Let's remember to always give thanks with a grateful heart. As a friend recently said to me "Every day is a blessing and an opportunity."


