It was heart-warming to see such a good attendance for the Kent Fire & Rescue Service (KFRS) presentation which gave a very good insight to their diverse fire prevention work. Unfortunately for many attending, me included, the consensus was we needed to hear much more about fire prevention measures we can and should take in our own homes - sometimes the obvious is not as obvious as it seems! To remedy this situation and for the benefit of those at the meeting a leaflet is being prepared in conjunction with KFRS and will be delivered to every household in Boughton Malherbe Parish. Please remember KFRS Community Safety Unit will on request visit anybody in their own home (particularly the vulnerable) to advise on fire safety and where appropriate fit smoke alarms completely free of charge. Tovil Green Household Waste Recycling Centre

I write to bring the following matter to your attention.

We are in the process of carrying-out some refurbishment works at the Tovil Green Household Waste Recycling Centre, Burial Ground Lane, Tovil. This will unfortunately necessitate a complete temporary closure of the facility for a 5 day period. The work involves essential repairs to the fabric of the site, and re-surfacing of the access road and some of the operational areas. It is a busy facility and due to the limited space available, it would be difficult to carry-out these works safely and efficiently without a full closure whilst the work is going on in the public areas.

The facility will therefore be closed with effect from Monday 19^{th} March for 5 days. The site will re-open on Saturday 24^{th} March 2012.

We are mindful that the nearest alternative facilities are some distance away, the impact this will have on our customers, and the potential for increased fly-tipping in the area. Accordingly we are planning various mitigating measures as follows:-

- During the 5 day closure period, the site entrance will be manned throughout
 the hours the site would normally be open. Customers will be given leaflets
 explaining the closure with directions/maps to the nearest alternative facilities
 at North Farm, Tunbridge Wells and Church Marshes, Sittingbourne. A sign
 board will be set up outside the site with details of the temporary nature of
 the closure and contact details for more information.
- Additional staff will be provided at the nearest alternative facilities to help deal with the increased usage.
- Any fly-tipping at the site entrance and immediate locality will be monitored and cleared daily.
- In advance of the closure, notices will be posted in the local press and at the site.
- The KCC and DC Contact Centres will be suitably briefed.
- The websites will provide appropriate information on alternative facilities

All these measures will be monitored, reviewed daily, and adjusted to meet needs as necessary throughout the closure period.

Pet's Corner!

MORE ITCHY PROBLEMS...

Last month we looked at the problem of fleas and how to tackle them in the home and on your pet.

But, what else can make your pet itch?

Once you have eliminated the possibility of a flea problem, your vet may look elsewhere for an answer to your pets itching.

Other parasites can cause itching, such as the sarcoptes and demodex mite.

These microscopic mites live in the pet's hair follicles or under the skin surface. Many dogs already have mites, but only develop a 'problem' if their immune system becomes suppressed and the mites reproduce rapidly.

Some dog breeds such as Dobermanns and Staffordshire Bull Terriers appear to be predisposed to developing such a problem. Both mites can cause itching, with hair loss, severe self trauma leading to skin infections and eventually thickening of the skin if left untreated. Sarcoptes is highly contagious, and is usually caught from the wild fox through indirect contact.

Diagnosis is usually made through a skin scraping which is examined under the microscope for mites. However, often the mites are difficult to see as they burrow under the skin, so diagnosis is usually based on the symptoms.

Treatment can now be accomplished using Advocate spot-on treatment, which is prescribed by your veterinary surgeon.

Other problems that may cause itching are food allergies, allergies house-dust mites, as well as plants, pollens, grasses and yeasts. The latter type of allergy is usually described as 'atopy', and need to investigated by veterinary dermatologist (skin specialist) to discover exactly what your pet is allergic to. Symptoms can include chewing of the feet and recurrent ear and skin infections.

See your vet if you are concerned that your pet is itching, and your usual flea preparations do not seem to be working.




What does the Right Mouse button do?

Probably the question I get asked the most, so I thought this would be a good topic for this month.



It doesn't matter if you use a mouse or the mouse pad on a laptop, the **Right Mouse Button** is the same.



Its proper name is: **Secondary button**

Mostly commonly known as "right-clicking" To right-click an item, point to the item on the screen and then press and release the **secondary button** (usually the right button).

Right-clicking an item usually displays a list of things you can do with the item. For example, when you **right-click** the Recycle Bin on your desktop, you'll see a menu with options to open it, empty it, delete it, or see its properties. To select any of these options, point to the item, but use the primary mouse button to perform the actually do something from the menu.



If you **right-click** accidently and a menu appears that you were not expecting, move the mouse pointer away from the menu to an empty area of the desktop and click the **primary button** (usually the left button) to make the menu disappear.

You can use **right-clicking** in almost all applications to provide you with a menu of options available for the item you are pointing at. Try it in the internet for printing, saving objects or word processing for cutting and pasting.

So, if you're ever unsure of what to do with something, **right-click** it and see what options are available. But note that you **never** double-click the secondary mouse button.

Note: You can change your mouse settings to suit your personal preferences. For example, you can change how fast your mouse pointer moves around the screen, or change the pointer's appearance. If you're left-handed, you can switch the primary button to be the right button. For more on customising your Mouse, go to Help and Support.

The March Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Aquarius at beginning of March, and moves into Pisces on the 12th.

The **Spring Equinox** falls on Tuesday 20th March, so after this date the days will grow longer than the nights. **British Summer Time** begins on Sunday 25th March, when clocks go forward one hour.

Full Moon occurs on Thursday 8^{th} March when in the constellation of Leo, and **New Moon** is on Thursday 22^{nd} March.

Mercury is at its greatest distance east of the Sun on 5th March, so there is a chance to see this elusive planet just after sunset. If you look low in the western sky at about 7 pm you should be able to see it shining very faintly.

Venus is again a brilliant "Evening Star" this month. It can be seen in the south-western sky just after sunset, and remains visible late into the evening. Relative to the stars it is moving rapidly north-eastwards, leaving Pisces in early March, and into the constellation of Taurus at the end of the month.

Mars is rising in the east at sunset, and is high in the southern sky at midnight. Relative to the stars it is moving steadily north-westwards in the constellation of Leo. Through a telescope it may be possible to see the dark and light patches on the surface, together with the white North Polar Cap.

Jupiter is again well placed for viewing in the evenings this month. It is high in the western sky at dusk and is brighter than any of the stars. Relative to the stars it is moving north-eastwards in Aries. Through a telescope you should be able to see the dark and light bands together with the **Great Red Spot**. It may also be possible to see, even through binoculars, Jupiter's four major moons.

Saturn is rising in the east in the late evening, and is well up in the southern western sky just before dawn. Relative to the stars it is moving very slowly in the constellation of Virgo. Through a telescope you should be able to see the famous rings together with many of its moons.

In my December article last year I reported that scientists at the Cern laboratory had carried out further experiments, that seemed to confirm previous experimental results that neutrinos (subatomic particles) did in fact travel faster than the speed of light. Following a report issued in February 2012, it would appear that the results had been caused by a loose fibre optic cable attached to one of the atomic clocks, which measured the departure and arrival time of the neutrinos. They intend to run the experiment again once the cable has been repaired.

Christian Message March 2012

The time between Christmas and Lent can be the most demoralizing time of the year. The expectation of Christmas and its celebrations have evaporated, the weather is often at its worst and there seems little to look forward to. Even the zeal of New Year Resolutions wears off quite quickly. There is, of course, the story of the Magi and the revelation that the world was so shaken by the arrival of a baby boy that Herod ordered one of the most horrific acts of the Gospels in the slaughter of the innocents. Later in January, the Conversion of St. Paul with the miraculous events on the road to Damascus gives us another example of how things can be changed beyond all expectation. Saul from Tarsus the tent maker and Pharisee a cruel persecutor of early Christians is changed forever on the road to Damascus. The period of Lent and the time in the wilderness forecasts the biggest change of all. It brings Christ to the beginning of his Ministry in Galilee and, ultimately, to the Resurrection.

So, hidden in the depths of winter and the darkest months are three examples of change which have framed the Christian world for over 2000 years.

For me, though, one of the most potent messages of change comes in the Parable of the Talents in which three 'slaves' are given five, three and one Talents "according to their ability" by their 'master' to look after. Two of them double the amount and are rewarded by a grateful master on his return. The third buries the money because he is frightened and is punished for not using the money profitably. A Talent was worth about 20 years of salary a labourer.

The message for us today is, it seems to me, about using whatever resources we have to develop and change for the good. I work in a school where there are many 'Talented' children. They are accomplished at sports, at dance and music, find science exciting and maths a challenge. Others are good at relating to their peers and at making friends. Some are ordinary but are good at being content and being happy. Every single one has something to offer and most do as time passes. They multiply their skills and they change through the process becoming 'whole' people.

Sadly, there are a few who bury whatever they have naturally and their progress makes them less happy and discontent.

In adult life things are the same. All of us know that if you want something done, ask a busy person. We see those who make the most of what they have – however great or small that is. There is something in those people that shines – in their eyes, in their response to adversity, in the way they speak to anyone they deal with. There are those, too, who love playing 'ain't it awful'. Who find fault as if for something to do and are ready to condemn rather than praise.

What has this to do with change? The people who use and develop their gifts do so in praise of God and the spirit of Christ's teaching. The Parable of the Talents tells us very clearly that it is pleasing to Him to strive to make the best of those skills and attributes we have been given and that the change brought about in us through those efforts will be rewarded.
