#### 01.25.01 Welcome and apologies for absence

#### 01.25.11 Neighbourhood Plan

The PC discussed how to begin producing a neighbourhood plan. Cllr Thompson agreed to look for a template online. The clerk will also investigate options for funding and report back at a future meeting.

#### 01.25.12 Neighbourhood Watch

No volunteers have yet made themselves known to the PC. The PC questioned whether there was an appetite for a neighbourhood watch scheme in the village. Cllr Hook will raise this at a future village hall coffee morning meeting. It was agreed that this item be removed for the agenda until we had feedback from residents at the coffee morning.

#### 01.25.13 Defibrillator Training

The PC are currently awaiting an update from Cllr Peter as to whether the Fire & Rescue Service could provide training. As Cllr Peter was not in attendance at the meeting, an update was not available at this time.

#### 01.24.14 Hugo Fox Domain Name

The PC discussed whether we wish to change the domain name to a .gov.uk address. It was agreed that the clerk would investigate this further. The chairman also requested that the clerk investigate whether the previous email BoughtonMalherbe.org.uk could be discontinued

#### 59 Bus News

Commencing on **Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> January**, a change of route and timings of the Wednesday only service to and from Maidstone will be introduced by the operator, Nu-Venture. This is designed to improve the reliability of the service which has been badly affected by the seemingly never-ending road closures in the area, especially when Chartway Street is closed because there are very limited alternatives suitable for buses.

The service will now start from Kingswood and then serve Ulcombe and Grafty Green before continuing to Maidstone via Headcorn and the A274 (and Otham). It will no longer serve Chart Sutton and Boughton Monchelsea. The advantage for Grafty Green is a reduction in journey time of around ten minutes.

The bus will leave **Grafty Green** village at **09.56**, stopping in **Headcorn**, **Forge Lane junction**, (opposite Costcutter) at **10.05**, **Sutton Road (Morrisons) 10.26**, due to arrive in **Maidstone Town Centre** at **10.39**.

It returns from Maidstone, King Street stop L2 (outside of Greggs) at 12.45, <u>fifteen minutes earlier than previously</u>, and runs via the A274 to Sutton Road (opposite Morrisons) 12.57, Headcorn (Forge Lane junction) 13.18, and Grafty Green at 13.27, before proceeding on to Ulcombe and Kingswood.

The English National Concessionary Travel pass, available to anyone who has reached state pension age, can be used on the bus, and for those without a pass the return fare is £4-90.

As ever the message is very much <u>'USE IT OR LOSE IT'</u>, so you are encouraged to make good use of this service to help ensure it continues.

It's a little way off yet but the trustee's will be holding the village hall's annual general meeting at the hall on Monday 7<sup>th</sup> April at 7.30 pm. The village hall is a charity run for the benefit of you the local community, everyone is welcome to attend and if you would like to know more about the running of the charity or have any ideas or suggestions for activities that you would like to host at the hall that would benefit our lovely village community please come along, we would be very pleased to see you.

Planning for the electrical re-wire of the village hall is progressing, it's a bit like a swan all calm and serene on top but paddling like mad below the waterline! We will keep you updated as the commissioning of the works progress.

We have just had a committee meeting when we discussed the events we will host at the hall during 2025 and in addition to the regular activities and the pancake evening detailed below we propose to host the following:-

- A bingo night in late Spring.
- > A quiz night in collaboration with Platts Heath School sometime in July.
- > Christmas craft fair weekend at the end of November.
- > The Christmas Quiz in early December
- A Christmas Panto.

Sadly, we have decided not to host a scarecrow festival this year as support for the event appeared to be waning, but I would like to take this opportunity to personally thank those of you who kindly made your lovely scarecrows last year which brightened up the village and encouraged a smile.

# **The Grafty Gourmet**

Bacon-wrapped sausages cooked in a sherry-laced, onion-rich sauce make this French onion sausage casserole a quick and easy dinner to warm you up on these cold nights.

#### FRENCH ONION & SAUSAGE CASSEROLE

6 rashers of streaky bacon 375g pack of pork chipolatas Vegetable oil for frying 25g of butter 500g of onions, sliced 2 garlic cloves, sliced

1 tablespoon of plain flour 100ml of medium dry or dry sherry, plus an extra splash

1 beef stock pot

3-4 bushy fresh thyme sprigs, plus extra leaves to garnish

8 large thin slices of fresh baguette or similar crusty bread

4 teaspoons of wholegrain mustard

125g of strong cheddar cheese, grated

Splash sherry vinegar

- 1. Cut the bacon rashers in half, stretch each piece by running the back of a kitchen knife blade along it, then wrap one around each chipolata. Heat the oil in a medium hob-safe casserole dish, add the pigs in blankets and brown over a medium-high heat for 4-5 minutes. Set aside
- 2. Add a splash more oil if needed, along with the butter, then add the onions and a plenty of salt and black pepper. Fry gently for 5-6 minutes until starting to soften. Stir in the garlic, then cover and simmer for 15 minutes, stirring once or twice, until the onions have softened and turned deep brown.

Stir the flour into the onions, then cook for 1-2 minutes. Add the sherry, stock pot and 500ml hot water from a just-boiled kettle. Stir to combine, then add the browned pigs in blankets and the thyme.

3. Simmer on a low-medium heat for 20 minutes until it thickens. Meanwhile, heat the grill to high. Toast the baguette slices on each side. Spread with the mustard, then scatter with the grated cheese. Cook under the hot grill until the cheese has melted and is bubbling and golden. Stir a splash more sherry and the sherry vinegar into the casserole, season to taste, then serve with the cheese toasts, and extra thyme leaves, if you like.

# **Gardening Tips**

This is the time of year for planning. Now that there is mainly evergreen shrubs and trees and bare branches to look at, think about where you have gaps at different times of the year and look at where you could plant new perennials, annuals or sow seeds. Perhaps keeping a notebook with a plan might help; it certainly does in the veg plot!

- All the canes of Autumn fruiting raspberries should be cut back to the ground now, summer fruiting ones are pruned later in spring.
- Cover the shoots of rhubarb with a bucket or large pot to force fresh growth.
- Sow broad beans indoors or in a shed or greenhouse to get ahead in the veg plot, try using damp toilet roll middles to save on pots.
- Plan your crop rotation in the veg plot (brassicas, root crops, legumes- peas, beans etc)
- Check the dates of your seed packets, including flowers, and discard old ones.
- Cut down ornamental grasses but be careful of emerging shoots.
- Chit potatoes.

#### Sue's Nature Notes

February can bring some mild weather encouraging a few hours in the garden preparing for the spring. Take a walk around and check for areas where there could be hibernating hedgehogs so you can avoid disturbing them **especially if you are going to use a strimmer!** 

Amphibians also hibernate but they will be in log piles, under stones or even tucked into a sheltered spot in the soil; it's usually around valentine's day that frog spawn or a string of spawn produced by toads, can be found in your pond. The blackbirds and newts love frog spawn! If you transfer some to a protected basin (not in direct sunlight) with a few stones/rocks at the bottom you will help them to mature into froglets.

Both these creatures love to eat slugs which are probably the least loved of our garden visitors; you can bait them by placing some damp cardboard under your flowerpots and then transfer them to the compost heap where they help to breakdown the dead material into useful humus.

#### Witch Hazels

Planting for winter interest, January and February, its spidery flowers range from pale to golden lemon to oranges and reds and some have the bonus of a glorious citrus scent which is mostly noticeable on a mild day.

Planning to brighten up a dark corner the yellow varieties would look stunning in front of an evergreen shrub under-planting with snowdrops; red flowering varieties planted to take advantage of the low winter sun can light up the flowers.

Witch Hazel (Hammamelis) like an open position but will tolerate growing in partial shade; a little careful pruning after flowering is recommended.

#### Platts Heath Film Club





#### **Christian Message February 2025**

Dear all,

February the season of lambs, spring flowers, valentines, and Lincoln's birthday my diary tells me. February 12<sup>th</sup> is still a state holiday if you happen to live in one of three states in the US.

It seems strange to us in Britain to imagine getting a day off for a prime minister's birthday, however famous. We do have various 'Bank Holidays' over the year and I am not sure of their origin, I just know how much I appreciate them when they pop up!

The word 'holidays' actually stems from their original source, they were the 'holy days' of the year when you were not expected to work but rather take time out and refocus on what really matters.

Many of our annual days off are still related to remembering and celebrating certain Christian feasts, events, traditions and rituals – Easter, Christmas for instance. Naturally we are glad to have these days interspersed in our year. Without them where would the natural breaks be? They give us time to be thankful, to slow down and to be with friends and family; to draw aside from ordinary life and possibly think about matters of a different nature – spiritual, ethereal, liminal.

As Christians, and I will say as humans, believers or not, we are also encouraged to do this with one seventh of our week – shabbat, sabbath, Sunday, a day of rest. A day when 'thou shalt do no work, wherever you live'. See Exodus 20:10.

Sunday rest has been stolen from us in the past 40 or 50 years — tho' we did not see that coming. We just wanted to break away from legalism and religious enforcement. And that wasn't wrong. But I do wonder how this lack of rest has contributed to burn out, anxiety, disease, agitation, rage, conflict, depression and exhaustion — it is so prevalent among us.

Fascinating stuff – I can see over and over how faith and the practices attached to it of simplification, prayer, mindfulness, rest, generosity, hospitality, magnanimity and humility – living justly, loving mercy, and walking humbly with our God are actually good for us. (Micah 6:7)

God is not a tyrant – quite the opposite; He is desirous of healthy community, wellbeing for those He created and loves, and time – time for all of us and each of us to spend with Him, with each other and even with ourselves. This way we flourish. Simple.

Enjoy February, take a long slow look at the lambs over in the field - they know how to rest and reset by in green pastures by still waters.....

The Lord really is our Good Shepherd.


