

# January Message from Katie Lam, MP for the Weald of Kent

January can be a bit of a funny month. The decorations are packed away, the weather is doing its worst, and many of us are bravely attempting Dry January or some other New Year resolution that felt like a good idea at the time. When it's cold, dark and wet, it's tempting to retreat indoors and hibernate until Spring.



But we're so lucky to live in such a wonderful part of the country, and there are plenty of reasons to get

outside, whether that's a walk through the Kentish countryside or a stroll down the high street. And there's one place many have long relied on as a refuge, whatever the weather and whatever the time of year: the local pub!

Back in December, I wrote for KentOnline about the importance of buying local. But being local matters just as much. Getting out, meeting your neighbours, and staying connected to your community matters all the more in rural areas. The word 'pub' is quite literally short for 'public house' — a place where people come together. But the sad fact is, if we don't keep using our pubs, we risk losing them.

Pubs have been hit especially hard recently with higher business rates and the hike in National Insurance contributions. Now more than ever, they need our help.

That doesn't mean ordering a pint every night, particularly if you're taking a break from alcohol. Our Wealden pubs offer far more than that. They're warm, welcoming places to get out of the house, see familiar faces, and enjoy yourself.

Across the Weald, pubs host regular quiz nights, chess clubs, pool competitions and charity events. They serve excellent local food, showcase local produce, and provide a space where generations mix in a way that's becoming increasingly rare. The other day, I was at the Albion Inn in Boughton Monchelsea where a patron was celebrating their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday, having also celebrated their christening under the same roof!

You might strike up a conversation you didn't expect, learn something new, or just enjoy the comfort of being around others. And let's not forget one of the great British pub's best perks: most of the time, you can bring your dog with you.

January doesn't have to be grim, and supporting pubs doesn't have to be expensive or complicated. It can be a coffee instead of a pint, lunch instead of dinner, or simply turning up to a quiz night with friends. Sometimes, the best New Year resolution is just to step out of the house. Why not support a local business while you're at it?

# Kent County Council – 6 Month Review piece

**Dear Residents** 

As we're moving into 2026, I thought it would be a good time to reflect on what Reform UK has been doing for the people of Kent in our first six months in office. We were elected with a pledge to scrutinise the finances of KCC and make savings, address potholes and be a strong advocate for the County. Our work has been to achieve those pledges and put Kent people and businesses first. I am pleased to report, there have been a number of successes from investing in our roads, driving efficiencies and championing Kent's interests. I will focus on the highlights for now but will continue to update on our other successes as we go through the year.

## **Highlights:**

- We inherited a challenging financial position, KCC had debts of £732 million, was paying debt interest charges of £84k each day and had a target of £121 million in savings and increased income to achieve in 2025/26. In our first six months the debt has been reduced by £67 million and £100 million of savings made with an additional £40m of future savings found.
- We commenced the implementation of £67 million investment into road repairs, which includes the biggest pothole repair programmes in the UK. So far, 22,000 potholes have been filled, 250,000 square metres of road patching (approx. 35 Wembley Stadiums in area) and resurfaced 210,000 square metres of road
- We scrapped the 'climate emergency declaration of 2019', thereby freeing KCC from expensive and unnecessary work; enabling more small Kent businesses to tender for work; encouraging a mixed economy of energy use and bringing back common sense to the climate debate in Kent.

- We are leading the campaign to get the Eurostar service to stop at Ashford and Ebbsfleet again.
- We're lobbying central government to allow Kent some proceeds from the Dartford Crossing and the Freight Lorry Levy.
- We commenced work to produce an Energy Strategy that will encourage the
  construction of small nuclear reactors and prevent huge solar farms from
  being sited on our best agricultural land and despoiling our beautiful
  countryside.
- We developed a unique response to the government's Local Government Reorganisation programme, that would look after Kent's best interests, enable local community engagement, and be less expensive for Kent taxpayers.
- We produced 'Reforming Kent'; a new plan for the County, which was launched in November 2025, and which gives the direction of travel for the County Council to achieve a better quality of life for Kent residents and businesses.

I hope you'll agree; huge strides have been made and there will be more to come in the New Year!

In the meantime, I'd like to wish you and your family Happy New Year!

## **Ward Councillor Update**

The Council's attention over the coming months will be heavily focused on the ongoing local government review, particularly the discussions around moving towards a unitary authority. This is a major piece of work and is likely to shape much of our activity for the foreseeable future. There are over 7 different options for Kent and we hope that the choice will be made before the end of February, as there are tight deadlines for the re-organisation and lead into the next round of elections.

Maidstone continues to face significant pressure due to the absence of a five-year housing supply. As we are unable to demonstrate the required level of housebuilding, many areas are now at greater risk of speculative planning applications. This creates uncertainty for communities across the borough. Parish Council involvement will be crucial as the planning workload increases.

We have said before that it is vital that every incident of crime or ASB, however small it may seem, is reported to the police. Use 101 for non-urgent matters and 999 for emergencies. Even minor reports feed into police intelligence systems, helping to highlight hotspots, anticipate problems, and guide the allocation of resources. Our "beat" police have been very active and are making great efforts to control what is going on in the area and have been much more visible recently.

Water management has also emerged as a notable issue this year. Although the summer was marked by drought, the Weald experienced several challenges connected to drainage, water flow and storage. We sit near the geographical heart of Kent, with many local streams and rivers feeding into the River Beult and eventually the Medway, while the River Stour begins just north of Grafty Green. Several farmers have struggled with the movement and retention of water despite the dry conditions, highlighting how complex our local water systems can be. We recognise residents' frustration with supply breakdown and hosepipe bans as well as the associated road closures, not to mention potential flooding. We are exerting as much pressure as possible on the Companies and Authorities concerned to put matters right.

This year has also brought changes in representation and leadership. We welcomed Sarah Emberson as our new Kent County Council member, and she has already begun to make her mark. At the same time, both KCC and Maidstone Borough Council are operating under relatively new leadership teams, no small task given the increasing likelihood that the two authorities may eventually merge into one. Meanwhile, Martin Round has taken on the role of Mayor. Altogether, it has been a year defined by new faces, transitions, and a good deal of uncertainty.

As we look ahead, we would like to wish everyone a happy, healthy, and prosperous New Year.

## Coffee & Croissants Open Morning Saturday 24th January 10 am to 12 noon



# **The Grafty Gourmet**

Bacon-wrapped sausages cooked in a sherry-laced, onion-rich sauce make this French onion sausage casserole a quick and easy dinner to warm you up on these cold nights.

### FRENCH ONION & SAUSAGE CASSEROLE

6 rashers of streaky bacon
375g pack of pork chipolatas
Vegetable oil for frying
25g of butter
500g of onions, sliced
2 garlic cloves, sliced
1 tablespoon of plain flour
100ml of medium dry or dry sherry, plus an extra splash
1 beef stock pot
3-4 bushy fresh thyme sprigs, plus extra leaves to garnish
8 large thin slices of fresh baguette or similar crusty bread
4 teaspoons of wholegrain mustard
125g of strong cheddar cheese, grated

- 1. Cut the bacon rashers in half, stretch each piece by running the back of a kitchen knife blade along it, then wrap one around each chipolata. Heat the oil in a medium hob-safe casserole dish, add the pigs in blankets and brown over a medium-high heat for 4-5 minutes. Set aside.
- 2. Add a splash more oil if needed, along with the butter, then add the onions and a plenty of salt and black pepper. Fry gently for 5-6 minutes until starting to soften. Stir in the garlic, then cover and simmer for 15 minutes, stirring once or twice, until the onions have softened and turned deep brown.
- Stir the flour into the onions, then cook for 1-2 minutes. Add the sherry, stock pot and 500ml hot water from a just-boiled kettle. Stir to combine, then add the browned pigs in blankets and the thyme.
- 3. Simmer on a low-medium heat for 20 minutes until it thickens. Meanwhile, heat the grill to high. Toast the baguette slices on each side. Spread with the mustard, then scatter with the grated cheese. Cook under the hot grill until the cheese has melted and is bubbling and golden. Stir a splash more sherry and the sherry vinegar into the casserole, season to taste, then serve with the cheese toasts, and extra thyme leaves, if you like.

# **Gardening Tips - Jobs for January**

- Deadhead pansies and violas to encourage plants to keep producing fresh blooms.
- Sow sweet peas, and after germination, place in an unheated greenhouse or cold frame.
- Take hardwood cuttings of shrubs.
- Force rhubarb.
- Ventilate greenhouses on sunny, mild days but don't forget to close at night.
- Trim off old hellebore leaves so flowers can be seen.
- Continue to mulch beds if not too wet or frosty.
- Clean up for Spring.....wash pots and clean greenhouses.
- Order seeds and perennials for next year and dream of Spring!

### **Nature Notes**

January is the month when the RSPB encourage people to take an hour to observe the types and numbers of birds that visit the garden – this year it takes place over 23 rd to 25 th January.

If you have left your garden over the winter with plenty of seed heads you may well be rewarded with birds such as yellow hammers, gold finches, chaffinches and even sparrows!

Words of advice from RSPB recommend that, as wildlife is constantly on the alert to detect danger, you know when to walk away. If you disturb an animal it will let you know; birds and mammals will use alarm calls and many will hide, run, or fly away to protect themselves. That burst of energy can be exhausting for migrant birds or animals that are nest building or raising young. If you observe these defensive behaviours, quietly retreat.



# Phishing - what's it all about from the Grafty Geek

Phishing is a type of online fraud that involves tricking people into providing sensitive information, such as passwords or credit card numbers, by masquerading as a trustworthy source. Phishing can be done through email, social media or malicious websites.

#### In summary:

- 1. Email phishing Most phishing attacks are sent by email. The crook will register a fake domain that mimics a genuine organisation and sends thousands of generic requests. The fake domain often involves character substitution, like using 'r' and 'n' next to each other to create 'rn' instead of 'm'.
- 2. **Spear phishing** Describes malicious emails sent to a specific person. Criminals who do this will already have some or all of the following information about the victim, which makes the email much more convincing compared to ordinary scams.
- **3.** Whaling Attacks are even more targeted, taking aim at senior executives. Although the end goal of whaling is the same as any other kind of phishing attack, the technique tends to be a lot subtler.
- 4. Smishing and vishing In both, telephones replace emails as the method of communication. Smishing involves criminals sending text messages (the content of which is much the same as with email phishing), and vishing involves a telephone conversation. One of the most common smishing pretexts are messages supposedly from your bank alerting you to suspicious activity.
- **5. Angler phishing** A relatively new attack vector, social media offers several ways for criminals to trick people. Fake URLs; cloned websites, posts, and tweets; and instant messaging (which is essentially the same as smishing) can all be used to persuade people to divulge sensitive information or download malware.

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
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

## **Christian Message for January 2026**

## "Do as I have done for you": Serving others as Jesus did

On the night before his death, we witness the unforgettable moment when Jesus kneels to wash the feet of his disciples. Afterwards, in John 13:12-15 we read:

<sup>12</sup> When he had finished washing their feet, he put on his clothes and returned to his place. "Do you understand what I have done for you?" he asked them. <sup>13</sup> "You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and rightly so, for that is what I am. <sup>14</sup> Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. <sup>15</sup> I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you.

In Jesus' day, a time of open-toed sandals combined with questionable animal deposits in the streets, washing someone's feet was a grim, undignified task. It belonged to the lowliest servants and certainly not the kind of job anyone was rushing to volunteer for. In doing this for his disciples, Jesus sets a radical and challenging example for us to follow.

When we think about serving others, often our minds jump to helping those we consider less fortunate than ourselves. That is undoubtedly important and a vital way in which to give of ourselves. But what is so striking about this moment is that Jesus isn't serving strangers, he is sacrificially serving some of his closest friends.

Someone has to do the washing up. Someone has to buy the groceries. When it comes to acts of service for those closest to us, they can become so repeated that we barely notice them or we can even do them from a sense of duty. Jesus' example invites us to something deeper: to intentionally seek out humble ways in which we can give of ourselves to bless those we share our lives with.

As we begin a new year and perhaps think about resolutions for the year ahead, what about choosing to follow the example of the Servant King by lovingly and sacrificially serving others, both those we have not met and also those closest to us? The key to this is remembering what we are told in 1 John 4:19: we love because he first loved us. The same is true of serving. Jesus has loved and served us, even to the extent of laying down his life to secure our freedom. As 2026 begins, may our love and service flow as a grateful response to that remarkable gift that we have received.

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
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
