

The Grafty Gourmet

CHOCOLATE BROWNIES WITH HOT CHOCOLATE SAUCE

For the Brownies:

225 grams of dark chocolate (minimum 70% cocoa solids)

225 grams of butter

2 teaspoons of vanilla extract

200 grams of caster sugar

3 large eggs (beaten)

150 grams of ground almonds

100 grams of chopped walnuts

For the Hot Chocolate Sauce:

75 grams of dark chocolate (minimum 70% cocoa solids)

125 millilitres of double cream

2 teaspoons of instant espresso powder

1 tablespoons of water

1 tablespoon of golden syrup

For the Brownies:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170°C (150°C Fan Oven). Melt the chocolate and butter gently over a low heat in a heavy-based saucepan.
- 2. Take the pan off the heat and mix in the vanilla and sugar, and let it cool a little, before adding the eggs (the eggs will start cooking if the chocolate is too warm, but you do not want the chocolate to go solid again). Once cooled, Beat the eggs into the pan along with the ground almonds and chopped walnuts. Turn into a 24cm / 9inch square baking tin. Use a foil one, if possible, as this makes it easier to get the Brownie out after baking.
- 3. Bake in the oven for 25-30 minutes, by which time the top will have set, but the mixture will still be gooey. (Do not overcook, as the top will burn. The centre is supposed to be slightly squidgy but will go solid once cooled). When cooled, cut carefully, four down, four across, into 16 squares.

For the Sauce:

- 1. Break up the chocolate and put into a heavy-based saucepan.
- 2. Dissolve the instant espresso powder in the water and add this, along with the remaining ingredients into the saucepan, then place the pan over a gentle heat and let everything melt together.

Once everything has melted, stir well, take off the heat and pour into a jug to serve.

3. Enjoy!

Gardening Tips

Here are some gardening tips for June:

- Many of the jobs for June are a continuation of the May jobs.
- Water....especially as there's no rain!
- Continue to sow annual seeds of flowers and veg
- > Finish planting up containers and hanging baskets with summer bedding
- ➤ Plant out beans, sweetcorn, courgettes, squash and pumpkins. Tomatoes, chilies and peppers can be planted up into their final pots and placed in a sunny position outside if not in a greenhouse.
- Plant out leek seedlings
- > Feed containers with a liquid feed of seaweed extract weekly
- Plant out tender flowers. Pinch out growing tips to encourage bushy plants (dahlias, sweet peas)
- Deadhead roses to encourage flowering.

Sue's Nature Notes

Woodlice by Daisy Meadows - 'What is lurking nearer to the soil?'

There are 35 species of woodlice native to Britain and remarkably they are not insects but crustaceans, with shrimps, crabs and lobsters as their relatives. They have 14 legs and breathe through gills, which is why they frequent damp dark places during the day and come out to feed at night.

Children love overturning stones or containers to discover woodlice, which when picked up obligingly roll into a ball, play dead, or run away depending on their species. They have many local names but are commonly known as slaters and pillbugs, these being the ones that roll up.

Their outer shell is called an exoskeleton which they moult as they grow bigger. They do this in two stages, shedding the back half first, then the front half a day or so later. They navigate by using the two antennae at the front and the two small "tubes" called uropods sticking out of the back of their bodies. Some species also use these to produce chemicals to discourage predators. Woodlice get rid of their waste by producing ammonia which passes through their shells as a gas. Children might like to test this by keeping woodlice in a jar for a short time and then sniffing the air inside.

A common woodlouse can live for three to four years. Apart from man, its main predators are centipedes, toads, shrews and spiders.

Woodlice are a gardener's friend as they are great recyclers and play a vital role as decomposers, especially in the compost heap. They feed on decaying wood, leaf litter, fungi, fallen fruit and decaying vegetable matter.

To attract woodlice to your garden, keep areas where they can hide during the day and provide a compost heap, wood piles and fallen vegetation. You will have an army of armadillos, pillbugs, slaters, cheesy-bugs, chiggy-pigs or any other local name they are called, working for you.

Sue's Blog

I finished my last blog commenting on the dawn chorus; I am really sensitive to bird song and over the years have been able to identify many of the common visitors to the garden and the surrounding countryside. So, it was a delight that on 1st May when I was unable to teach my yoga class in the village hall we met in a local garden for a practice.

It was a perfect morning with a very gentle breeze, almost cloudless sky and the birds where **singing!** There was a garden warbler, goldfinch, coal tit, blackbird, thrush, blackcap, chaffinch, robin, dunnock, wren, house -martin, buzzard to name a few. If you want to increase your ability to identify the birds around, you there is an excellent 'App' called 'Merlin'.

I also mentioned about the trees coming into leaf and this year the oak is before the ash and there is a saying 'Oak before the ash is a splash, but ash before the oak is a soak' so maybe we are in for a dry summer.

The range of plants in my new garden are very pleasing; the previous gardener must have liked peonies as I have four, one of which is flowering profusely, huge dark pink blooms with a beautiful scent.

The wildlife in my garden is mainly insects and birds but I do have slow-worms; so far, I have come across four as I tend the plot; very happy!

How do you spell love asks Piglet?

Winnie the Pooh answers wisely, You don't spell it. You feel it!


