Summer 2025 update from your Maidstone Borough Councillors MBC Mayor Martin Round and Ziggy Trzebinski

It has been a busy year so far with one or two upsets from our perspective. A major one is that MBC are behind on housing targets and five-year land supply. This is the result of a scaling down in numbers of existing housing units on one or two sites as well as the current economic situation, making developers loathe to start developments which either they may not be able to sell, or make little profit. The knock-on effect is that even though MBC may refuse unsuitable applications, the Building Inspectorate may agree them just to get the numbers up.

The council has also, much against our own wishes, agreed to pump £7.5m into the de-carbonisation of Maidstone House, when its value is currently only £4m. With only two years remaining for Maidstone Borough Council to run, this is a folly, as no-one knows what will happen to the building after local government reorganisation.

Additionally, 3 Independent Councillors have resigned from Lenham which will lead to a by-election costing the council in excess of £50k. It would seem that the current administration has some challenges!

The good news? Well, our Mayor, Martin Round, has been busy promoting Maidstone to businesses, supporting local charities and generally attending many civic events. The VJ day celebration in Headcorn was well attended and a very good afternoons entertainment after the serious matter of remembering our fallen war heroes.

Ziggy has been involved in a fair number of planning matters and ward casework. Positive news is that there is now a project to alleviate the effects of flooding in both Headcorn and Ulcombe, in which he has been involved. It is hoped that the many properties in the area will be protected sufficiently to withstand flash floods within the next 18 to 24 months.


Both Martin and Ziggy have attended as many parish council meetings as possible and contributed positively to the meetings.

The Grafty Green Wanderers cricket match against Smarden goes down to the very last ball.....



As the Grafty Green Wanderers gathered outside the oak framed Pavilion, the late evening sun glistening as it hit the wicket of Smarden Cricket Club there was definite tension in the air.....

Where were the opposition? Were the Wanderers at the right ground?

The visible strain on the face of the Match organiser, Paul "The Brickie "faded away as the Smarden Team arrived, a young, fit and very athletic group of players...!

The Grafty Green Growlers gathered on the edge of the outfield and were again joined by David Chantler, a player from the 1950's, who remarked that there were 4 Chantlers supporting the Wanderers Team tonight, himself and 3 in the Smarden Church graveyard!

Carol took her seat, as the traditional barrel of Harvey's was gently placed on the steps to the Pavilion, The Wanderers won the toss and decided to bowl.... Game on!

The Wanderers opening bowling pair of Josh "Hanky Panky" and Gary "Gray by Night" Thompson tore into the Opening Batsman, one being caught off a great delivery by "Hanky Panky" and the other being clean bowled by a magnificent delivery from "Gray by Night" leaving Smarden at 6 for 2. The opening Bowlers finished their 4 overs with exactly the same stats of 16 for 1, an excellent start.

The Wanderers were delivering a much improved fielding performance with everyone committing to save every run, the highlight of which was a "Simone Biles" like gymnastic tumble by "Hanky Panky "on the boundary to save a definite 4 to the obvious delight of the Growlers.

Smarden's number 3 and 4 batsman, namely Hooton and Hope had to steady the ship and they did so by slowly putting on runs until Hope was clean bowled by Matt "The Beef" lles for 20 with a classic Bothamesk like delivery.

Toby joined Hooton at the wicket until "The Brickie" delivered a teasing delivery that Hooton sent miles into the air, it hung for what seemed an eternity until it landed into James "Baby face" lles, safe pair of hands, with "The Brickie" ending up with excellent bowling figures of 1 for 17.

Smarden were now 69 for 4 with just 5 overs to spare when their leading Batsman, Andy Underwood strolled to the crease. He made his intentions clear from the start when hitting 3 boundaries in his first over, a couple of quick singles in the next, then 2 sixes in the third and another 2 sixes in the last.

He stood on 47 with the last ball to come, the Wanderers set out to stop a final boundary, Steve "The leg" Legon delivered a looping spinning delivery which only gave up a single, denying the batsman his 50 to leave Smarden with a final score of 123 for 4.

Knowing what was required The Wanderers opening batsmen took to the field. Over the years, many a young youthful cricketer had learned their stroke play under the tutelage of Jack "The Prof" Geary but today was his day and it was his time. A quick single and then he was in his stride keeping the scoreboard ticking over with boundary after boundary.

Nick "The Chairman "Eastwood was struggling to find the rhythm and panache he'd shown in the nets a few weeks before and was eventually bowled by Hope in the 8th over leaving The Wanderers at 37 for 1 just slightly behind the required run rate.

"Baby face "The Captain, strolled to the crease to face Hope. Three good length balls were just pushed away and then BOOM! "Baby Face" drove one to boundary, the Growlers erupted, he meant business.

The partnership with "The Prof" lasted until the 15th over when "The Prof" on a fabulous 45 was caught off the bowling of Leggis. A great innings which included 8 boundaries leaving The Wanderers on 81-2.

Dean "Scratchin Tendulkar" made his way to crease, he was lucky to survive the first delivery which struck his toe, swung wildly and missed at the second which safely reached the keepers hands, the third cleanly removing his middle stump meant a long walk back to the Pavillon and a "Bombay" duck.

Ada "The Hook "then nicked a good delivery from Wilding which was caught by an excellent wicket keeper much to the frustration of his grandchildren who missed his time at the wicket.

The Wanderers having lost a quick succession of wickets found themselves at 86 for 4.

Niall "The Ginger "joined "Baby face "in the middle and played a great supporting roll running between the wickets as "Baby Face "kept the scoreboard ticking over. "The Ginger "was finally caught off the bowling of Andy Underwood.

"Hanky Panky "then joined the fray until he was run out for 5 after chasing down every opportunity.

"Baby Face " continued dominating the strike with 2 fabulous sixes until he launched another Underwood delivery high towards the boundary. The Growlers willed it over, alas it fell through the oak tree to be caught magnificently just inside the boundary rope. A fantastic Captains innings of 59 including 3 sixes and 5 fours had come to an end.

The Wanderers were 119 for 7 requiring 5 runs to win the game with just 1 ball remaining.

As the light started to fade, The Beef "was on strike, he knew what he had to do as the Smarden team spread themselves around the boundary, camouflaged by their green tops they seem to disappear into the green foliage like the Japanese in the Burmese jungle.

Underwood came into deliver the final ball, it fizzed on the pitch but just didn't pop onto "The Beef's "swinging willow bat, no run.

Smarden were returned the victors by 4 runs, a fabulous game taken down to the very last ball of the day.

I would like to mention Mark "The Essex Swinger "who gallantly stepped in as umpire delivering an authoritative and phlegmatic "Dickie Bird "esk performance, "Dangerous "Dave Ryan who took control of the sophisticated electronic scoreboard in the Clubhouse and finally "The Docker "for his thoughtful motivational speeches and general barracking both at the match and in the Chequers afterwards.

Man of the match was your beloved Captain, "Baby face" lles with a true Captain's innings of 59 peppered with multiple boundaries and an outstanding catch whilst fielding deep in the outfield.

At the time of writing this newsletter having consulted with our electrician Tim I am pleased to inform you that we appear to be on track to re-open the hall after the electrical rewire the week beginning the 1st of September and on behalf of the trustees I would like to thank you all for your patience and understanding whilst the hall has been closed for these works to be undertaken.

I should also like to thank Tim for his hard work with the project. As a community we are reliant on the work to be completed in a timely manner and Tim has been most diligent in working towards achieving this goal. The lighting, sockets and kitchen should all be fully completed and safe to use, there will be a slight delay whilst the heating is fully connected, tested and signed off for use, but this should all be fully operational shortly after the hall opens for business again at the beginning of September.

There will be some superficial damage to the internal decoration to the hall following the works, and pictures etc. may not be immediately returned to the walls but this will be rectified as soon as possible.

As part of the refurbishment, we will have this damage made good and the hall redecorated over the Christmas break. Colour choices will be displayed at the hall which everyone can consider, and there will be an opportunity to vote on your preferred colour scheme so, if you have the time please come along to the hall and cast your vote. The last time the hall was redecorated internally was probably 20 years ago so if the majority vote for bright pink be careful what you wish for as you may be stuck with it for a very long time!

They have enjoyed using the hall over many decades and wished to give something back to the community. The Grafty Gourmet

This is another very simple yet great recipe. Honey and Mustard are always a great partner for sausages.

SAUSAGE, APPLE & BUTTERNUT SQUASH TRAY BAKE

- 1 small butternut squash, about 750g
- 2 red onions, sliced into rings
- 2 apples, unpeeled, cored and sliced
- 12 pork sausages
- 3 tablespoons of olive oil
- 1 tablespoon of runny honey
- 1 teaspoon of English mustard
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 15g fresh flatleaf parsley, finely chopped, to garnish
- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C/180C Fan. Cut the butternut squash into quarters and leave it unpeeled. Remove the seeds then cut each quarter into 5mm slices.
- 2. Place the butternut squash a large baking tray with the onion, apple and sausages. Drizzle with 1 tablespoon oil and season well with salt and pepper. Roast for 20 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, whisk together the honey, mustard and remaining oil in a small bowl. Drizzle over the sausages and vegetables and turn to coat everything in the dressing.
- 4. Return to the oven for 10 minutes until the sausages are browned and cooked through and the vegetables are tender. Sprinkle over the parsley and serve.

Gardening Tips

Gardening tips for September

- Clear spent crops in the veg plot. Mulch after rain or sow green manures.
- Continue to sow hardy annuals, direct or in modules.
- > Order or buy spring bulbs. Daffodils can be planted later in the month.
- > In flower borders, divide perennials that have got too big for their space to rejuvenate their growth.
- > Plant any new perennials. Both jobs need to be done once it rains!
- Cut back top dead/spent growth of perennials that look untidy but leave any with interesting seed heads.
- Plant containers for spring and winter interest once summer bedding has finished flowering.
- Sow oriental leaves.....mizuna, mustard and pak choi.
- > Take cuttings of tender plants, eg. fuschias and pelargoniums.
- Cut down wildflower areas of lawn and leave for a few days for seeds to drop before composting the top growth.

It's been difficult to remain positive in the garden when so many plants seem to be suffering from lack of water. I have been cutting back dead growth and hoping that perennials will revive once the rain comes and will spring back into life next spring. Focus on the plants and crops that have enjoyed the hot, sunny and dry weather. I've had a bumper crop of figs!

Sue's Blog - nature notes

This month I have noticed that I have a willow warbler in the silver birch and gold crests in the neighbour's leylandii; a nice bonus for such and uninteresting tree! And, the starlings are beginning to gather in their flocks which gave me entertainment last winter with their murmurations.

It was the 11th August that I heard the robin singing again; they go quiet and then start again in August but with their winter song!

Then, 12th August, the night when there was a chance of seeing a meteor shower; the day had been hot and the skies a cloudless blue, so I anticipated a clear view of the night sky. Not only are there too many streetlights to get a really good dark sky but a mist rolled in obscuring the sky completely. The next morning was one of those misty starts to the day that often happen in August.

Len Valley Benefice September 2025

Everybody is welcome

For I am the Lord your God who takes hold of your right hand and says to you, do not fear.

I will help you. Isaiah 41:13

Christian Message September 2025

Dear people of Grafty Green

By the time you read this it will be nearly time for my last service in the Len Valley Benefice before I retire. I have been vicar in the area for eight years, and time has flashed by, bringing many unexpected things. Of course, there was the whole Covid epidemic when church services went on-line, and then- at a more personal level- this year I have needed to deal with my own mother's death (her ashes are in the graveyard in Lenham) and a great big operation to restore my heart function. (The good news is that it was a great success, thanks be to God.)

The biggest thing I want to say in this Christian message is a humungous, 'Thank you'. One of the reasons that I felt drawn to this area is that it was so friendly and the churches were so welcoming. Not all villages are like that. Some are snobby, or closed to all 'outsiders', and in some all sense of community has evaporated. But you are not like that. This whole area is one where newcomers are welcomed and encouraged to join those who have been born and bred here. Thank you for welcoming my wife and I here.

Our local schools in this area are an enormous asset, and so are our churches. They are not just there for occasional services but are places of real warmth that inject kindness and compassion into our villages, as well as being places for marking the significant events in life. They contain many people who really care, whether that means listening, or running food banks, or village breakfasts, or cream teas, or running coffee and cake.

Sadly, the running finances of our churches are not very healthy. What will happen as I leave will be in the hands of the church wardens as well as the local Archdeacon from Maidstone, but some solution to continue ministry in this area will be sought and found. If you care about the ongoing life of the churches here, then please do speak to the church wardens (Kenneth Alexander and Vanessa Goodwin) to encourage them.

Let me end by praying for you. May the God whose love for us was so great that he sent his son to die for us, bless all the peoples in this wonderful Len Valley Benefice, and may the churches in this area thrive and flourish to reflect ever more fully the eternal good news: that God in his love is for us and not against us.

Vicars have to move on when they retire (so that they're not a pain in the proverbial to future vicars!), but Lorraine and I will miss you so much. God be with you!


