

#### News from St. Nicholas Church – June 2024

Good to hear the nightingales talking from tree to tree across the garden in the evenings and mornings again this year, very welcome, as we are told how their numbers have plummeted in recent years. Also enjoyed watching from the garden a few days ago, hundreds of small gulls wheeling around a small field being prepared again for wildlife re-planting. Not only the gulls, but at least four buzzards (maybe more), a kite and many other interested birds, all feeding on the disturbed grubs and other goodies being uncovered. What a joyous cacophony!

#### Reminders

The church porch remains open at all times. Enjoy a hot drink as you visit and take a break. Paper notes are available for prayer requests and they will be read in Monday morning prayer time in the chapel. There is a bible available on the windowsill. Please make use of the mini food bank if you need. There is a larger food bank in St. Mary's church in Lenham, open daily from 10am-4pm.

The main church building is open for services, cleaning, meetings etc. please contact the churchwardens for a key if you wish to visit at other times.

Church service times are on the noticeboards by the porch, the roadside and the village hall in Grafty Green.

Celtic Morning Prayer is said in the side chapel each Monday 9-9.30am. This is an informal time, with bible readings and time for prayer, spoken or in silence, for people, world problems or worries. Can be helpful to share a need in confidence.

Village Coffee Morning takes place every Tuesday 11.30am -2.00pm in the village hall in Grafty Green. The Post Office is usually open 12.45-2.15pm. There are often other items for sale, eg. Local honey, free range eggs, teas, jams, marmalade, handmade cards etc. All donations for the tea/coffee and cakes are shared equally between the church and a charity chosen by the 'regulars'. You, too, can make a difference!

The monthly meditation takes place in the church at 2pm on the first Saturday of each month. The session lasts for half an hour, followed by tea and biscuits if you wish to stay. It is highly recommended, relaxing, thoughtful and silent.

Laura and Ollie's wedding on April 29th was a delightful occasion with friends from the village joining the celebrations and providing a much-appreciated informal reception for the couple and their family after the church service. Angela's bunting had yet another outing, as did Roy and Jacquie's marquee. Amazing refreshments were provided, including a tiered wedding cake and all very well received! The weather was a bit chilly, but did not spoil the outdoor occasion. Laura, on behalf of the couple, spoke of their gratitude to everyone for their kindness and generosity. We continue to pray for them in their new life together.

The Craft Fair weekend on 11th and 12th May, was another triumph for the organisers. Again, they created such a friendly atmosphere in the village hall. Many thanks to everyone. Our little stall was well supported and we have been able to provide more than £220 for the church.

80yrs after the D-day landings will be commemorated with the lighting of a beacon at the Old Rectory, by kind permission of the Goodwin family, on June 6th. We look forward to hosting refreshments in the church from 7pm that evening.

### Bingo Night - Saturday 29th June 7 for 7.30 pm



#### Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May 2024 at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall Ref 001/2024

Present: Cllrs, N Eastwood, C Tomlinson, G Thompson, L Hook Mr R Galton (Chairman)

In attendance: Cllr Z Trzebinski (Maidstone Borough Council); Clerk Mrs M Norris

The preceding Chairman opened the meeting at 8.10pm.

#### 1. Intention to record or film the meeting

No notifications were received.

#### 2. Election of Chairman for Boughton Malherbe Parish Council

Mr Galton called for nominations for chairman, Cllr Eastwood was proposed. The PC voted unanimously in favour and Cllr Eastwood was elected and signed the declaration of acceptance of office. Cllr Galton at this point stood down and retired from the meeting.

#### 3. Election of Vice Chairman

Cllr Tomlinson was elected as Vice Chairman.

#### 4. Election of Chairman for Planning Committee

Cllr Hook was elected.

#### 5. Election of Chairman for Finance & Staffing Committee

Cllr Thompson was elected.

It is confirmed that all Councillors present duly signed their Declaration of Acceptance Forms.

Although ClIr Andrews had been elected by the parish, she attended the earlier Annual Parish Meeting and made a statement that she did not wish to work with ClIr Eastwood and would not be signing the Acceptance of Office Form. Secretary's Note: By not signing the DAO form, the position is vacant at the close of the meeting and the election office will be advised.

RESOLVED: the Minutes of the meeting held on 4th March 2024 were taken as read, confirmed and signed as being an accurate record of the proceedings.

#### 9. Public Session

In excess of 20 members of public were present as the APCM followed the Annual Parish Meeting: A resident raised the issue of rural fire safety. Boughton Malherbe have 13 fire hydrants that need to be maintained. A volunteer has kindly ensured that, at this point in time, the hydrants are fit for purpose but going forward at least half of the parish's hydrants suffer from being non visible due to vegetation etc. The resident asked if the PC would commit to keeping on top of the hydrants and ensuring that they are accessible. A map of the hydrants location and their corresponding numbers was available to the PC. The Emergency Plan was also raised as there were concerns that it was not up to date and relevant. The individual agreed to submit the request in writing.

Another resident requested that the new parish council thank the outgoing Parish Council members for their service, in particular the chairman who had been a long-standing member with many years' service to the community. Cllr Hook agreed to this and the PC requested that it be on record that the members of the previous council were thanked for the service to the parish council and the wider Boughton Malherbe community.

#### 11.6 External Audit & AGAR

The Annual Governance Statement. End of Year Account statement and the certificate of exemption were approved and signed by the chairman.

The clerk confirmed that the audit with Lionel Robbins will take place on 6<sup>th</sup> June at which point the commencement date for the exercise of public rights will be confirmed and advertised.

#### 11.7 Bank Mandate & Signatories

It was Resolved that Marie Norris (Clerk), Cllr Thompson and Cllr Eastwood and Cllr Hook would act as signatories on the Cambridge and Counties Account & the Lloyds Bank accounts.

#### 11.8 Amesis Review of Contract

Following a request from Amesis to review the hourly rate of £14.00 set in 2022 to £15.00 and an increase to hours due to additional extra deposits, the PC resolved to agree to the pay and hours increase for a two-month period. The contract will then be revisited in further detail at the next parish council meeting.

#### 12. Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)

The Chairman requested that the clerk have authority to use the CIL funds He explained that the CIL funds were restricted and should be used as a priority for council spending until exhausted.

#### **D-Day 80 Celebrations**

The Parish Council were to consider sponsoring a joint celebration with the Village Hall and St Nicholas Church. An email detailing the proposal had been sent to councillors prior to the meeting. The PC agreed to sponsor the event and fund to the value of £500, and a working group would be set up. The PC clerk was invited to sit on the working committee and this was agreed.

#### 13. Christmas Party

The chairman advised that he had been approached about a Christmas Party to be held at the village hall. At this point no further details were provided albeit that the Chairman had passed on the village hall contact details. Councillors agreed in principle to the idea of a party but would wish to see further details surrounding the proposed event.

#### 15. Engaging with Residents

Website – The PC authorised the clerk to make changes and update as necessary. Facebook – The PC discussed the use of a Facebook page, the clerk advised that this would be best run by individuals and not as a parish council Facebook page directly. Councillors should be mindful that any interactions on social media are representative of them as individuals and are not the views expressed by the Parish Council as a collective. Residents wishing to raise matters with the PC should use the appropriate channel and contact the clerk either via email directly or through the Boughton Malherbe website.

#### 16. Any Other Business

Cllr Tomlinson raised concern about a criminal incident that had taken place in the village recently and whilst the incident had been reported to the police, Cllr Tomlinson felt that the PC should take action to raise public awareness particularly with regard to lone women. It was felt that personal safety should be highlighted to those in the village and Cllr Hook agreed to provide personal alarms to the village hall that they could give to those attending the coffee mornings. This could be publicised to widen the scope and ensure that such alarms were available to all that might benefit from them It was also felt that information on personal security could be published via the PC and Cllr Hook and Cllr Tomlinson will coordinate with the clerk to do this.

Defibrillator Training run by Kent Fire & Rescue Service was taking place in Ulcombe and a local resident suggested that BMPC may also like to arrange something similar. The chairman agreed to look into this further. It was also suggested that the chairman of BMPC may wish to meet regularly with the chairman of Headcorn and Sutton Valence parishes as sharing knowledge discussing mutual interests would be beneficial to BMPC.

Flood Warden training supplied by KCC was also highlighted to the PC as at present the village have no Flood Wardens.

# **Helen Whately - MP**

#### 'An update from your local MP Helen Whately

'This time two years ago, my team and I were flat out helping families across Faversham and Mid Kent process their Homes for Ukraine applications.

Nearly 200,000 Ukrainians were matched in those few months, and it was a wonderful display of British generosity and kindness. Just like in those early weeks of the pandemic, we saw the true nature of people in a crisis — willing to come together and help each other out. Asylum and immigration are two of those touchpaper issues that we tend to avoid talking about. But I think that we should. Often, when we do, we find that we have far more that unities us than divides us.

Almost everyone I speak to agrees that as a rich and safe country we have a duty to help people in need around the world. People also agree that the UK benefits from having some people come and live and work here from other countries.

But the fact is there are always going to be more people who want to come and live in Britain than we can realistically make a home for. For every family who comes to live here, we need to build a new house, add another car to our roads and find them dentist appointments – all things that I know people feel keenly here in Kent.

That means we have to make decisions about who comes, and I think we can all agree that this should be a fair system, and one which people in this country have some control over. When it comes to asylum it should be those in the greatest danger, or those to whom we owe a debt of gratitude. It shouldn't be those young, fit, and rich enough to skip the queue by getting on a boat.

I think a lot of people mistake the recently passed Small Boats legislation as the government wanting to send people to Rwanda – when in fact the opposite is true. Once the scheme is up and running, people simply aren't going to risk their life crossing the channel any more.

That will give us the breathing space to create a much fairer asylum system – taking people directly from conflict zones instead of processing a backlog of people coming from safe countries like Albania.

It's important to recognise that these people aren't inherently bad or doing anything other than what's best for them or their family. The evil is in a system which

incentives them to risk their life in the hope of skipping the queue – and that's what we're putting an end to.

When it comes to legal migration, our decision should be based on what skills we need. Wherever you look in this country – whether that's in our health service, in pubs and restaurants, or on our fruit farms, there are people who have come to the UK to work without whom we simply wouldn't be able to function.

This is something that I'm acutely aware of as the Health and Care Minister, where I saw first-hand how overseas workers helped our health service get through the winter just been. In the long-run of course we want our UK workforce to fill these gaps, and last year we published the first ever long-term NHS workforce plan. But training doesn't happen overnight, and in the meantime, we can't leave people without the care they need.

Ultimately this issue boils down to control. The ability to choose who needs our help, and whose help we need. If we don't talk about this issue, or we let it divide us, it makes it far harder to build a system where we have that control.

That is the system we have been trying to build. Passing the Small Boats legislation, changing the rules on dependents for Student Visas, and creating our points-based immigration system. It hasn't been easy, but it's worth it for a system which is fairer than ever before.

## **Grafty Gourmet**

This is another great tasting, yet very simple recipe. Serves 4 with just two salmon fillets.

#### SALMON PASTA BAKE

Ingredients:

350g of large pasta shells (or Penne)

1 tablespoon of olive oil or 20g butter

4 spring onions, finely chopped

150ml of single cream

4 tablespoons of half-fat crème fraîche

2 smoked salmon fillets, flaked

150g of frozen peas, defrosted

100g of asparagus, chopped into 5cm lengths

Finely grated zest of 1 lemon, plus wedges to serve (optional)

2 tablespoons of dill, finely chopped, plus extra to serve

50g of finely grated parmesan

- 1. Heat the oven to 180°C fan. Cook the pasta in a pan of salted water for 5 minutes (less than the pack instructions), then drain, reserving a cup of the cooking water.
- 2. Heat the oil or butter in the casserole dish over a medium heat and cook the spring onions for 1-2 minutes. Add the drained pasta, cream, crème fraîche and about half the reserved cooking water, then cook, stirring constantly, for 1-2 minutes until the sauce thickens. Add the remaining ingredients and enough of the cooking water to make a light sauce, stirring to coat the pasta. Season well.
- 3. Bake for 15-20 minutes until bubbling and golden. Scatter with the extra dill and serve with lemon wedges and a salad.

### Sue's nature notes

## The Brimstone butterfly.

One of the first butterflies to emerge in early spring after spending the winter hibernating in ivy, holly or bramble and is considered a woodland butterfly.

They are fairly large; the males are sulphur-yellow whilst the females are greenish white. The male will scent the female to mate and she will have one brood, laying a single egg on the rib of an alder of buckthorn leaves. They hatch in June and the caterpillar is green and will eat the leaves of the host plant, pupating in July - the pupae are green and leaf shaped hanging underneath the leaf or a twig by a silken pad and girdle.

The butterflies emerge after about a fortnight; some of the plants preferred by the Brimstone for feeding are thistles, bluebell, bugle, cowslip, dandelions, knapweed and vetches, fleabane and betony.

See the love that the Father has shown us so we are right to be called God's children, which is precisely what we are.

In recent weeks, I have been recovering from surgery and so have spent more time than usual watching daytime television. Perhaps you know the programme that I'm thinking of as I write. It features an auction.

The bidding can be brisk at first, but as the price creeps up maybe only two people are left interested. As they continue to bid against each other, it raises the price a little until one gives up and the other becomes the victor as the auctioneer announces "going, going, gone."

Maybe at a decent price but maybe not as much as the seller had hoped for. And then another item fares even worse and is withdrawn as it fails to reach the reserve price. No-one has valued it enough.

And there are times when we too can feel undervalued and unappreciated. Maybe there are times when we treat others similarly? We are probably all guilty of thinking of ourselves and not valuing others. And, maybe we can more easily spot the worst and not the best in others?

I picked this passage for this month when we are encouraged to think about Father's Day. Of course, we all have had earthy fathers – some good, some not so good – but I encourage us all now to remember our Heavenly Father.

Wherever we are – we matter to him. Others may dismiss us – He will not. Wherever we are, whatever we do, our Heavenly Father loves us completely, wholly.

I don't understand it – but I gladly accept it. I pray that you do too.


