

CHRISTMAS or XMAS

Does the title puzzle you? Let me try to explain.

I start with the ending of both the words above - MAS. It means FESTIVAL or FEAST - and is one reason why some people refer to the Communion service as The Mass. So, CHRISTMAS really means - "The Festival of Christ". Festivals are usually happy and joyful and noisy affairs, so you wouldn't expect such a festival to fall on a solemn day, such as Good Friday - and undoubtedly Christmas Day will be a noisy time.

But XMAS is different. When I was in school taking algebra, it took some time for me to grasp that the subject is essentially simple - all you have to do is find the value of X - the unknown quantity. Think how often you see Christmas written us Xmas: in this case, XMAS becomes "The Festival of the Unknown", and sadly, to so many people, that is what CHRISTMAS is - the celebration of someone or something of which they have little or no knowledge. Whilst we do not know the exact date of the birth of Jesus, many years ago, tradition established the 25th December as the day when we commemorate his birth and by so doing, we are celebrating the birth of someone who has become part of our everyday life. In so many ways we have learnt of God, in the person of Jesus Christ, being with us day by day, so our festivities at

Christmas are for someone we know, and whose presence we appreciate - NOT for an unknown being.

I can recall, as a child, going to my grandparent's house on Christmas Day. There was an empty chair at the head of the table: I was told that that was where Jesus would be sitting if he was present. Probably, that won't be happening anywhere this year - to so many the person of Jesus seems to have been removed from our thinking. Let me put that in context by telling you a simple but charming story. A family had the custom of allowing the youngest member of the family to "be Father Christmas" and distribute the presents under the Christmas tree. When Sarah was 6 yrs old, it was her turn - so she gave out what was a large number of parcels - and then proceeded to crawl all round the tree. Her father asked her - "What are you doing?" Her reply was - "I thought that this is Jesus' birthday, but I guess we all forgot to buy him a present!"

May the love and the blessing of the Christ Child be with you all, not only at this Christmastide, but also throughout 2009.

It will be strange having Christmas on the beach, put another sausage on the barbie, All for now, be in touch soon.





The Grafty Gourmet

As Christmas is fast approaching, I thought I would theme this month's recipe accordingly. This is an ideal starter for your Christmas Dinner, and is simple to make. Preparation time is about 20 minutes and cooking is about 25 minutes. Serve with a leafy salad.

SMOKED SALMON SOUFFLES WITH DILL

(Serves 4)
50g/2oz Unsalted Butter
50g/2oz Plain Flour
300ml/½ Pint of Milk
3 Eggs
Salt and Freshly Ground Black Pepper
1 Egg White
175g/6oz Chopped Smoked Salmon
Extra Smoked Salmon cut into strips
1 tbs Chopped Dill
Extra Sprigs of Dill for Decoration

- 1. Heat the butter in the pan and add the flour. Cook for 1 minute over a low heat, stirring. Take off the heat and gradually stir in the milk. Place back on a low heat and stir until thickened.
- 2. Beat eggs and season with salt and pepper. Beat into the flour, butter and milk mix. Whisk the egg white until stiff, and fold this into the mixture. Then fold in the chopped smoked salmon and chopped dill.
- 3. Butter 6 ramekins and spoon the mix into each one. Smooth the top of each mix with a knife or spoon.
- 4. Bake in a pre-heated oven, Gas 5 or 190 degrees for 25 minutes or until risen and golden. (If using an electric oven, cook without the fan on).
- 5. Remove from the oven and serve each decorated with the strips of salmon, placed in curls on the top, and a sprig of dill. Serve with a leafy salad.

Grafty Garden Cuttings – December

The garden magazines all say "now is the time to take hardwwod cuttings from your trees and shrubs. It's easy and you will soon have many new plants to grow-on and plant out". It is, but who wants dozens of the same buddleia, forsythia, weigelia etc (unless the odd one is to replace an old tired speciman). Not many of us. Fruit bushes like blackcurrants or gooseberries, maybe so if anyone wants to try their hand at rooting cuttings Perhaps the best solution is to visit friends gardens and swap a few instead.

Time to look back at the past year - well, maybe not as it really was too dismal. Wet, cloudy and late frosts that ruined the stone fruit crops, those little munching monsters on the cabbages and now pigeons stripping the holly berries so early. I have cut some branches and put into water, plus swathing some in-situ with fleece, just to save a few for Christmas. We hope the birds leave the mistletoe alone too, as it has more berries than ever before. Counter to belief, it does little harm to any healthy tree it infests, be it apple, crab apple, poplar or lime unless they are old and sick anyway when it might just hasten their demise.

The usual advice for this time of year: place wormeries and planted containers into shelter or protect them with a jacket of bubble wrap. Pond pumps and water features should be removed, cleaned and stored frost-free and a ball or similar floated on the pond, to stop it freezing over completely. Ice should never be hammered to break it, for the shock can kill fish.

I have begun the winter clean-up for, despite wanting to keep as much undergrowth as possible for the wildlife, if I leave it all until the spring I shall never finish the job. I have also made a start on reviving one of the boarders, but with everything so wet and stodgy, there are just a few holes and a great number of well trodden plants to show for my efforts. Not good.

Winter pruning can begin as well and the clearing of the vegetable garden, plus leaf collecting and as much as possible composted: no seed heads of invasive weeds. They should be binned or burnt. If not in use, clean out and disinfect greenhouses, pots and trays and leave well ventilated, to dry out.

Check for mouldy leaves and caterpillar damage to overwintering plants, also root damage by the vine weevil grubs for pests and diseases enjoy indoor protection as much as the plants. Keep watering to a minimum and avoid splashing the leaves. Stored potatoes need good protection from frost but should not be kept too warm, as they will begin to shoot.

Christmas for me, is always made more festive by a poinsettia or three. Look out for well branched plants that are sturdy, with healthy, dark green leaves down to soil level, not rocking in the pot and at least 5 heads of coloured bracts and if the bracts have little yellow and red flowers in the centre, so much the better.

It will take UP a lot of your time, but if you don't give UP, you may wind UP with a hundred or more. When it threatens to rain, we say it is clouding UP. When the sun comes out we say it is clearing UP

When it rains, it wets the earth and often messes things UP. When it doesn't rain for awhile, things dry UP

One could go on and on, but I'll wrap it UP, for now my time is UP, so............ it is time to shut UP ...!

The December Night Sky

At the start of December the Sun is in the constellation of Ophiuchus, and is moving into Sagittarius on 17th December.

The shortest day of the year is Sunday 21st December. This is the Winter Solstice, when the Sun reaches its most southerly point in the sky. Full Moon will occur on Friday 12th December, and rises in the northeast at sunset. New Moon is on Saturday 27th December.

At the end of December, Mercury is setting about an hour after the Sun. It can be seen to the lower left of Jupiter, but is not as bright. There will be much better views of this planet early next month.

Venus is now a brilliant 'Evening Star' and can be seen in the south-western sky just after sunset. At the start of December it sets about 6.30 pm, and by the end it will be setting about 8 pm. Venus is moving rapidly north-eastwards out of Sagittarius and into Capricornus on the 17th.

Mars will not be visible this month as it is in conjunction with the Sun on 5th December. I will, however, return to Mars to give you an update on Nasa's Phoenix Lander, which I mentioned the in my June article.

The giant planet Jupiter is low in south-western sky after sunset, and is to the right of Venus. Jupiter gradually sinks into the twilight, and by the end of the month it will be difficult to see. Saturn rises in the middle of the night, and is high in the southern sky at dawn. It is moving very slowly south-eastwards in the constellation of Leo.

Now back to Mars. Early last June Nasa's Phoenix Lander made its successful yet perilous descent onto the surface of Mars. This was Nasa's second attempt to explore the poles following the failure of the Mars Polar Lander in 1999, when the computer shut down the descent engine.

The mission was a great success, sending detailed pictures of different types of terrain, and carrying out experiments such as measuring the pH of Mars's soil. Unfortunately, as temperatures fell to -1,300C in Mars's arctic wastes, the Phoenix is no longer operational, and will never rise again.

"Talk about the pews......" (G K Chesterton)

The battle of the pews rages in many rural churches. The armies fight from entrenched positions. Those opposed to their removal use slogans such as, "over my dead body" while the modernisers provide practical reasons for the reduction of some, if not all, pews. Pews are news! I heard recently that a member of the Diocesan Advisory Committee had described a church in another part of the county as "over pewed!"

As a former churchwarden (no axes to grind now!) I jumped at the opportunity to attend a meeting of Sanctuary UK in Christ Church, Spitalfields, at which Sir Roy Strong was the main speaker. His most recent book. "A Little History of the English Country Church" (Vintage £9.99) has now been published in paperback.

Sir Roy's main points provide useful facts for any discussion about the beautiful village churches in our Diocese. Let me list a few:

• Never forget that for 8 centuries the Christian church managed without special buildings.

- Church buildings have always been subject to change, e.g. during the Reformation, by the Tractarians and by the keen Victorian modernisers.
- There has been a demographic change since churches were first built. In 1800 80% of the English population was rural but by 1900 80% lived in towns thus making many village churches redundant.
- Three of the best attended annual services were introduced comparatively recently and have nothing to do with the Gospel though they are useful in attracting worshippers. These are Remembrance Sunday, a sad inclusion after the Great War; Mothering Sunday which saw life in 1945 and Harvest Festival which was a Victorian innovation.

Sir Roy concluded that conservation is an outmoded term. What is needed is adaptation. "Unless you allow a building to change you will kill it." He was critical of Simon Jenkins recent popular book on English churches because the author is an unbeliever who denies that the buildings are monuments of faith. This statement is at odds with Sir Roy's contention that a church building is a "place of revealed faith."

He said that PCC's must decide whether they want small defensive congregations or small vibrant churches. He encouraged the involvement of whole communities in discussions about church buildings with a view to making them more widely used.

It was an interesting day with the added bonus of Tracey Emin being one of the speakers. She is not a Christian but lives near Christ Church and described it as "my church"; a place where she goes for peace and inspiration.. I have no doubt that there are many in our village who would use similar words to describe St. Nicholas, Boughton Malherbe if only it could be left unlocked.
