Hello! I'm Katie, and I'm now the Member of Parliament here in the Weald of Kent. I represent our area in the House of Commons, acting and advocating on behalf of all my constituents. I'll be writing in the *Malherbe Monthly* every now and then to keep everyone in Broughton Malherbe up to date with what I'm working on.

Right now, I'm very focused on transport. As you'll know, getting around our beautiful rural home isn't always easy. All too often our roads and pavements are closed for works, or there are big lorries on

inappropriate country lanes, or there's no longer a bus route where we need it. We rely on the roads to get to work, school, the shops, GP appointments, to see friends and family — everything! The state of our roads and our bus services is fundamental to how well we can live our lives.

But the problems we have seem to be sidelined in Westminster. This is a very urban Government and urban Cabinet, and when I see taxes on farmers and millions of pounds being given to big city councils, I worry that the countryside just isn't that important to them. We deserve better.

That's why I've joined the Transport Select Committee — a cross-party group of MPs in Parliament who work to scrutinise the Department for Transport and all sorts of other relevant bodies and organisations. I successfully pushed for the Committee's first enquiries to be on bus services in rural areas, and "street works" (when utilities companies dig up the roads) and the disruption they cause.

I want to know exactly how people find the roads and buses — and anything else transport-related — around here to inform my work in these inquiries and beyond. So I'm sending out a survey to every home, asking your thoughts on local transport. You can fill it out and post it back to me when it arrives through your door, or complete it online using the QR code below (or by going to <a href="www.katieforkent.com/transportsurvey2025">www.katieforkent.com/transportsurvey2025</a>). It only takes 5 minutes!

#### 59 Bus News

Commencing on **Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> January**, a change of route and timings of the Wednesday only service to and from Maidstone will be introduced by the operator, Nu-Venture. This is designed to improve the reliability of the service which has been badly affected by the seemingly never-ending road closures in the area, especially when Chartway Street is closed because there are very limited alternatives suitable for buses.

The service will now start from Kingswood and then serve Ulcombe and Grafty Green before continuing to Maidstone via Headcorn and the A274 (and Otham). It will no longer serve Chart Sutton and Boughton Monchelsea. The advantage for Grafty Green is a reduction in journey time of around ten minutes.

The bus will leave **Grafty Green** village at **09.56**, stopping in **Headcorn**, **Forge Lane junction**, (opposite Costcutter) at **10.05**, **Sutton Road (Morrisons) 10.26**, due to arrive in **Maidstone Town Centre** at **10.39**.

It returns from Maidstone, King Street stop L2 (outside of Greggs) at 12.45, <u>fifteen minutes earlier than previously</u>, and runs via the A274 to Sutton Road (opposite Morrisons) 12.57, Headcorn (Forge Lane junction) 13.18, and Grafty Green at 13.27, before proceeding on to Ulcombe and Kingswood.

The English National Concessionary Travel pass, available to anyone who has reached state pension age, can be used on the bus, and for those without a pass the return fare is £4-90.

As ever the message is very much 'USE IT OR LOSE IT', so you are encouraged to make good use of this service to help ensure it continues.

#### **The Grafty Gourmet**

This is another very simple recipe. Cod is used here, but any white fish can be used instead. The distinctive flavour of the paprika and oil from the chorizo really compliments the fish. Serve with rice or just some crusty bread.

#### **SPANISH CHORIZO & COD STEW**

100g of diced chorizo

1 onion - sliced

2 garlic cloves - sliced

1 teaspoon of smoked paprika

1 tablespoon of tomato purée

250ml of vegetable stock

400g tin of chickpeas - drained and rinsed

2 sliced roasted red peppers from a jar

500g cod loin

Chopped fresh flatleaf parsley

- 1. Heat a large non-stick pan, then fry the chorizo and onion for about 8 minutes or until soft and caramelised. Add the garlic cloves and smoked paprika and cook for a further minute.
- 2. Stir in the tomato purée, vegetable stock, chickpeas and roasted red peppers. Cook for 4-5 minutes until thickened.
- 3. Cut the cod loin into 4cm chunks, then place carefully into the sauce. Cook for 3-5 minutes or until cooked through and the fish flakes easily. Sprinkle with chopped fresh flatleaf parsley and serve with crusty bread or rice.

#### **Gardening Tips**

- Mowers may need cleaning or a service
- Clean pots and seed trays to reduce the risk of bacteria and subsequent seed failure
- Dahlia growers should check over-wintered tubers and pot up all that are free of rot, keep moist and frost free until planting out in May
- Sow indoors or heated greenhouse tomatoes, cucumber and courgette seeds; chit second early potatoes to plant out 30 cm apart
- Raspberry canes can be planted and any direct sowing can begin
- Avoid any hedge trimming until nesting birds/chicks have flown

## Sue's Blog Views from my window – beginning the year

The days are lengthening but the weather is unpredictable; gales, perpetual rain and then a sunny day! There are lime trees at the top of the road which are silhouetted against the winter sky – often grey and bleak but when the afternoon sun is shining on the naked branches, they have a bronze glow. The little gang of wood pigeons keep watch from the upper branches whilst the starlings prefer the television aerials opposite.

The jackdaws strut along the ridge of the properties across the road whilst the blue tit flits back and forth collecting a sunflower see on each occasion.

In the garden there are aconites flowering; their bright yellow petals contrast against the dark soil and there is a promise of clumps of daffodils and snowdrops that will brighten the view of the front garden.

There is much to do to make the garden to my liking! Where to put a pond; construct the raised beds for the vegetables and move the hydrangeas? The wind has brought down delicate twigs from the silver birch which has too much ivy growing up it; another project.

The first wildflower is about to bloom in my lawn (meadow to be) – a dandelion! Plus the grass is full of lawn daisies, their flat leaves spread out on the surface.

At the end of the day, not quite evening, there is a mini murmuration of starlings – what a joy!

#### Sue's Nature Notes

The sap is rising! This is the time of the year when mating, nesting, hatching and brooding happens. The first signs are the pairing up of adult birds; wood pigeons, which mate for life, strut around together whereas smaller birds may sing from a vantage point to attract a partner. You may notice the birds picking up moss, small twigs or anything fluffy for nest building.

Wrens pick a spot close to the ground, quite often within ivy against a wall or the base of a tree. It is widely known that blue tits and great tits like to nest in a hollow of a tree, a hole in a gate post or a purpose made nesting box. Thrushes, which are less common now, need bushes, bramble similar to blackbirds. Robins are opportunists and will pick a variety of sites from the ground up to ten feet or more high in thick herbage and can be very close to humans' coming and going.

Out in the woodlands or fields there are ground nesting birds such as skylark, pheasant, partridge, woodlark and woodcock so walking on a pathway and keeping your dog on a lead will avoid disturbing these birds.

We have already collected a large pack of used postage stamps to send to them which will be weighed and posted to them shortly, and I will advertise the result in due course.

These donations to these worthy causes are all because of the kind collections provided by yourselves, the residents of Egerton and our local community.



#### **Christian Message March 2025**

#### Strengthen the rubbery knees!

Did you ever have one of those toys which were a wooden animal on top of a base with a push plunger in it? When you push the plunger, the strings would go slack and the animal would wiggle around and collapse! They're so simple but so fun! It's less fun on the occasions when our own lives feel like that! We all face times when our own knees are suddenly feeling a lot less rigid!

There is a passage in the Bible, in Isaiah 35:3-4, which gives an amazing encouragement to those who may feel in that situation. In a paraphrase of the Bible called 'The Message', we read the following:

Energize the limp hands, strengthen the rubbery knees.
Tell fearful souls, "Courage! Take heart!
God is here, right here, on his way to put things right
And redress all wrongs.
He's on his way! He'll save you!"

Verses like this are so impactful because they are outworked with two different emphases. In this passage is both an uplifting promise for the way God desires to care for us and also a picture of who He wants us to be for others.

The verses speak so intimately of a God who is not distant or aloof. He is not a hard taskmaster wagging his finger at our failings. Instead, He is "here, right here, on his way to put things right and redress all wrongs". How awesome it is to know that the divine creator of the universe desires to be involved in the challenges of our day to day lives! We can put our hope in Him. He is a God of justice and restoration!

As well as being on the receiving end, we get to be the one who brings this good news and aids in the strengthening of others! Jesus demonstrated the 'strengthening of rubbery knees' in extraordinary ways and we follow his example. When we consider those with whom we share our life; our family, our close friends, our colleagues, I'm sure that we can all think of those whose hands are feeling weak at this time. We get to bring the message of "Courage! Take heart!" God is here and He wants to put things right.


