News from Maidstone Council

Reduce, reuse, recycle and be reassured where it's going

Maidstone residents can be sure that none of their recycling is being stockpiled or sent to landfill. Recent reports in the national press have suggested that recycling is in crisis with rubbish carefully sorted by householders piling up in vast warehouses as the market for waste paper collapses.

That isn't the case in Maidstone.

In Maidstone paper is reprocessed at Aylesford Newsprint in Kent where it is recycled into newsprint. Card is reprocessed in Kent into new cardboard; glass is reprocessed in the UK into new glass bottles and jars; cans are reprocessed in the UK into steel and aluminium for various uses; plastics are reprocessed in the UK into plastic for various uses and garden waste is composted in Essex.

Cabinet Member for the Environment, Cllr Mark Wooding said: "Keep on recycling because we're going to make it even easier for people to recycle once the council's new fortnightly recycling service for paper, cardboard, tins and cans and some types of plastics is fully rolled-out by May.

"We are committed to ensuring recycled materials from Maidstone residents are dealt with properly and we are recycling everything either locally or nationally.

"We want to reassure people that what they recycle is going to the right places and in Maidstone's case not piling up in vast warehouses as the national newspapers suggest."

Most households will be getting a new 190 litre bin for their weekly rubbish collection. Residents will be asked to use their existing green bins for their fortnightly recycling collections and special arrangements will be made for people who don't have wheelie bins or space for a second bin.

Glass bottles and jars can be taken to recycling banks, where they will be recycled into new bottles and jars but if you put them in with your rubbish they will be collected and burnt and used as aggregate in road construction.

There are no changes to the way Maidstone council collects garden waste.

There'll be fun, fun, fun in February

Maidstone Museum has the half-term activities covered so pop in and take part.

On Monday, February 16th youngsters under 12 can 'makasaurus'. From 10.30am-12.30pm and 1.30pm-3.30pm there will be drop-in sessions to create fake fossilised dinosaur bones by sprinkling sand over a 3D picture. The cost is £2.

On Tuesday, February 17th there is a session called guess how much I love you? Children can come along for a story-telling and craft activity. This will be on from 10.30am-11.30am and 1.30pm-2.30pm. The cost for this is $\pounds 2$ and it is recommended for under 5's.

On Wednesday, February 18th there will be a chance to make an ancient Greek plate out of clay. It can be decorated with black painted figures and youngsters can learn about pottery that was fashionable over 2,000 years ago. The cost is £2.

There will be a Roman objects hands on station on **Thursday, February 19th**. From 10.30am-12.30pm and 1.30pm-3.30pm there will be a drop-in session looking at artefacts and replicas from the museum's collections. This event is suitable for all ages and is free.

Also on **Thursday**, adults and children over 12 can make a fabric covered coat hanger. All the materials are provided or you can bring along your own fabric remnants.

To finish off half-term week at the St Faith's Street museum there will be chance to make a Netsuke on a key chain on **Friday, February 20**th.

Netsuke are Japanese toggles that secure cords holding personal object containers onto robes. Materials will be provided and the cost is £2.

The Grafty Gourmet

Being a bit of a romantic, I have decided to do a recipe for Valentine's Day. However, it can be made all year round. As usual, the dish is very simple to make, so even some of the non-cooking males out there, could make this for their loved one.

VALENTINE'S CRAB NEWBURG

(Serves 2) 175g/6oz White Crab Meat 75g/3oz Long Grain Rice 150ml 1/4 Pint of Double Cream 2 Eggs Yolks 25g/1oz Butter 4 Tablespoons of Sherry Salt, Paprika

1. Boil the rice in salted water until tender. (Between 10 and 15 minutes).

2. Melt the butter in a frying pan and add the crab meat and fry gently for 2 minutes.

3. Put the eggs yolks and cream in a bowl and beat together.

4. Stir the sherry into the crab meat, and then slowly stir in the egg and cream mixture. (This must be done slowly, ensuring that the heat is not too high).

5. Season with a pinch of salt and paprika.

6. Simmer gently for 5 minutes without boiling, and stirring quite frequently.

7. Drain the rice and arrange on a warm plate, and add the crab mixture to the centre and serve.

Grafty Garden Cuttings – February

With gardens either solid or sodden, it has not been easy to continue working them this winter. A quick dash between down-pours, to cut off a barrow load of dead leaves and top growth has been about the limit - no digging, no mulching and very little pruning, as yet. Other things have kept us busy, including decorating, although I cannot claim to have done much, as apparently I splash the paint too much?!! I do however; provide endless coffee and helpful advice, pointing out runs and missed patches and suggestions along the lines of 'shall we do the bathroom next1. Quick, back to the gardening.

Weather permitting this month, the digging and tidying really need completing; sweet peas can still go in, likewise an early sowing of peas and beans, which can all be started off in pots, or with peas, in lengths of guttering and transplanted at a later stage. With the ground so wet, it is best to work from a plank, or cover sections with cloches to aid warming up and drying out, but better still, stay off all together and plant into containers for a few early crops. Buy seed potatoes and 'chi11 them, i.e.: stand them, the end with the 'eyes' uppermost, in trays (egg boxes being ideal), in a cool, light and frost free place, for shoots to develop, ready to plant next month. Autumn fruiting raspberry canes should be cut to the ground and any spotted or old leaves cut away from hellebore clumps, which both removes disease and shows off the blooms. Winter flowering shrubs can be given a tidy, once blooms fade and maintenance to tools and machinery can be completed.

Very few birds have visited our feeders this winter, but we still have some about the garden, especially blackbirds - or we did have. I followed the pitiful sound of one in distress to see two hawks flying off, one with the blackbird in its talons. Little piles of black feathers testify to their other successes at the top of the garden. A day or two later, I disturbed another hawk as it plucked the feathers from a small catch, in the Norway spruces. A few little feathers floated sadly down as the hawk dashed away: I know they have to live too, but they seem to be doing a good job of clearing out many of our local garden birds. On a more positive note, the Long Tailed Tits come busily through on most days, Blue, Coal and Great Tits are also about and pair of Thrushes are back. When I did manage some undergrowth clearance, I also found the remains of a clutch of partridge eggs, so I hope they too, will return. The Robins have also paired up, so it might be an idea to trim any unruly hedges before nesting starts - but not if hard frosts are forecast again.

For those of you with areas of dry ground, beside walls or hedges, for example, why not come along to our next Garden Club meeting, on Tuesday 3rd February, and find out how to deal with them?

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New Computer Courses for 2009

Situated in the centre of the village of Egerton, the Telecottage is run by volunteers and offers computer courses for all levels, starting with the absolute beginner.

Egerton Telecottage Computer Centre is starting a new programme of computer courses in the New Year - including a brand new course to give parents hands on experience in protecting their children from some of the risks of using the Internet.

Carol Hulm, a qualified instructor and computer consultant, who has joined the team of volunteers at the Telecottage, has designed a short two session 'Parent Aware' course which will alert parents, relatives or school staff to the risks for children of using the internet and provide easy to understand tips for checking children's on line activities and methods of parental control, including understanding anti-virus software.

Carol says "I think the internet is brilliant with all the special offers and the special networking that it brings - it can save you money, bring you closer to friends and relations from around the world and lots more. But it can bring risks. If you don't know what your children are doing on the internet they could accidentally get into trouble using chat rooms, downloading inappropriate material or allowing a virus on the computer that could cost hundreds of pounds to get fixed. It only takes a few hours to understand how to keep your computer free from viruses and make it safer for your family"

The Telecottage is planning to offer some other new courses in the New Year if there is demand – such as editing videos to put on to computers and using Skype for free telephone calls. It now has the latest Office 2007 software with Vista and can provide training in how to use it for those used to earlier versions or facing it for the first time with a new computer.

The February Night Sky

At the start of February the Sun is in the constellation of Capricornus and is moving into Aquarius on the 16th. Full Moon occurs on Monday 9th February in Leo. At this phase, it is on the opposite side of the sky to the Sun, and therefore rises at sunset in the east, and shines through the night and sets in the west at sunrise. New Moon will occur on Wednesday 25th, and will be visible in the southwest at sunset.

Mercury is at its greatest separation from the Sun on February 13th, but as it rises just an hour before sunrise, it again will not be easy to see this elusive planet.

As many of you will have noticed, Venus is still a brilliant 'Evening Star' in the southwest at dusk, and throughout this month it is not setting until about 9:30 pm. Relative to the stars Venus is moving rapidly north-eastwards in Pisces, and is far brighter than any of the stars. In fact it is at its brightest on 19th February, and can be bright enough to cast a faint shadow. It is interesting to note that on the evening of Friday 27th February, the narrow crescent Moon will appear just below Venus, and will be in the same field of view if observing through a telescope or binoculars.

I am afraid that this month both Mars and Jupiter rise shortly before sunrise, and therefore will not be easily visible. We will all have to wait until after summer to get any reasonable views of these planets. Saturn is still rising in the middle of the evening, and is well up in the southern sky by dawn. It is moving very slowly north-westwards, and lies to the lower left of the star Regulus in Leo.

In 'The May Night Sky' article last year I briefly explained the theory of thermonuclear fusion, the power source of our Sun, and in fact all the stars. I also mentioned that many scientists were working on ITER, 'The International Thermonuclear Experimental Reactor' with the aim of creating the fusion reaction on Earth, which could solve the world's energy problems. To this aim scientist in a Californian laboratory will begin attempts to ignite a tiny man-made star in a laboratory and trigger a thermonuclear reaction. From a speck of fuel no bigger than a pinhead, their goal is to generate temperatures of more than 100 million degrees Celsius and vast pressures. If successful, this will be the first step towards building a practical nuclear fusion power station. The process involves firing 192 laser beams at a small fuel pellet held inside a gold capsule, needed to generate x-rays. The laser beams enter the capsule through holes, releasing x-rays, which heat the fuel to vast temperatures. This in turn causes the outer shell of the fuel pellet to burst off generating huge pressures, which compress the fuel. Hydrogen atoms then fuse together creating thermonuclear fusion.

The Month's Good Cause

Kenward Trust

It is four years since we featured Kenward Trust as our "Month's good cause". Then they had just started work on the construction of a new residential rehabilitation wing to be built onto Kenwood House, at Yalding. That is long completed and in operation, and now they are set to open in Hawkhurst a residential rehabilitation project for women.

This local Christian charity provides a home for homeless people needing a stable base to recover from problems or addiction, including drug and alcohol misuse. Delivered by fully trained and competent staff, the main components of the programme at the new venture will be individual care plans, group therapy, key working, weekly objectives, personal development reviews, spiritual awareness, life skills (including, where appropriate, parenting skills) and more, all designed to help residents return to society as contributing members of the community.

The continuing expansion of their work means more fund-raising is required, above that needed for the day-to-day running of the charity. The trust needs donors to enable them to continue this work of bringing new life from addiction to those who consider themselves to be worthless, by contributing to their funds.

They also ask you to pray for their work, including not just the residential homes, but also the two structured day recovery programmes they run in Maidstone and Tonbridge, and their small team of outreach workers who actively seek out and help those unable to help themselves. Incidentally, one outreach team that works with young people in Pembury and who go out in our Winter weather to achieve their aims say "On nights like this we could really do with some of those large "puffer jackets" or padded anoraks, but realise that finances are scarce just now so we will have to wait" If you think you can help, please phone the Grey Zebra Youth Outreach Team on 01622 817 820.

Christian Message – February 2009

Testing times

You shall not put the LORD your God to the test Deuteronomy 6:16

The trouble is that I have done so, many times. Maybe it's because He always helps when I need it.

In the 1980s my brother lived in Cincinnati and a friend lived in Canada. I saved hard and by the spring of 1981 I could afford to visit America.

Two weeks before going my mother phoned me at work. "Don't go, you'll come home in a box," she fretted. Scathingly, I continued with my plans, determined to prove that nothing could go wrong. At 22 I was fearless and I was about to test God far further than I should.

The cheapest flights were To JFK Airport where I needed to spend 36 hours on my own in New York before starting my travels overland. I went to ask an airport official about taxis.

"You alone?" He looked incredulous. "Go down the escalators and only get in a <u>yellow</u> taxi as advised by one of our people in uniform. Keep your bags with you in the back - and stay away from 42nd Street." For once I decided to do as I was told.

The next official bundled me into a <u>blue</u> taxi and swept my bags into the trunk. The driver asked where I was going and looked up the price of the hotel rooms in a catalogue before setting off at high speed, ignoring my request for my bags to be returned. I tried to follow his route with my street map but he swung round corners and circled the city every which way he chose. 42nd Street came and went. It was quite obvious we weren't going to the hotel.

I began to pray but somehow seemed removed from the situation as if in a dream. I <u>was</u> praying for my life but at the same time I felt sure that God would look after me, in whatever guise that took. I felt many emotions but I can remember remaining calm.

Eventually the driver stopped in a remote street and turned round to look at me. He asked me for half of everything I had for my trip. I simply gave him what he asked for. He shrugged, perhaps disappointed that I hadn't given him a good excuse to dump me in Harlem, and he took me back into the city.

I was filled with thankfulness and praise but such is the insatiable energy of youth that, far from taking heed of my mother's words or those of the first airport official, I spent the next day walking the length and breadth of Manhattan Island. Only much later did I really think about all the *What ifs* and that we are actually responsible for our own actions. I'd tested God beyond any reasonable degree and yet He had continued to look after me quite literally, every step of the way.

So why shouldn't we test Him?

Do not put the LORD your God to the test Matthew 4:7

We should respect the Lord obediently and have faith in His promises rather than seek continual proof of His power and care. Due to our own weakness I expect we do the latter far too often but because He loves us He forgives and continues to provide the reassurances we need, sometimes quite dramatically!
