I have been the editor, publisher and printer of Malherbe Monthly since 2006. However, later this year I will be moving away to Cornwall and accordingly the magazine will require a new editor if it is to continue as a going concern.

To help anyone or group of people who may be willing to take on these roles please find below a description of what is involved in producing the magazine. The roles are currently not paid except for the required printer supplies.

- Send out email requesting articles and any adverts 2 to 3 hours a month
- 2. Managing advertisers and adverts 1 day a month
- 3. Formatting magazine with articles and adverts 4 hours a month
- 4. Printing 314 copies of magazine 4 hours a month
- 5. Folding magazines to A5 format 4 hours a month
- 6. Batch up magazines and deliver them to the distributors 2 hours a month
- 7. Format magazine for uploading issue to Parish Council website 5 mins a month
- 8. Purchase printer supplies 1 hour a month

For anyone who might be interested in taking on these roles I have available a more complete and detailed description of what each task involves. Additionally I am more than willing to show them how this is done.

Village Hall - August Newsletter

As it is a community space in the village to be enjoyed by all I thought it might be informative to briefly explain the constitution of the hall. Originally constructed in the early 1920's the hall is a registered charity, (no.288091), it has 12 unpaid volunteer trustees who live locally who administer the running and activities at the hall.

As well as hosting the regular activities organised by various local clubs, societies, organisations and service providers such as Yoga, Pilates, Tai Chi and Art class the trustees organise regular events such as quiz nights, bingo, scarecrow festivals, craft fairs, the summer fair and the Christmas Panto. The only person who is paid by the charity is the lady who comes in and cleans the hall. All income received by the hall is used to meet the regular outgoings such as insurance, cleaning and utility expenses. Any surpluses are utilised in providing further activities at the hall to be enjoyed by the community and to meet the ongoing cost of maintaining the hall in good condition.

It's your hall so if you have any ideas or suggestions as to how we could further use the hall for the benefit of the community don't be shy please let me know so that I can discuss any suggestions you have with my fellow trustees.

Our inaugural Bingo Night was held on the 29th June a good time looked to be had by all and there were lots of lovely prizes kindly donated by our generous sponsors. I will need to discuss with the other trustees but it looks as if we should hold this as an annual event.

At the time of writing Sally and her team of crack cream tea makers are preparing for the first of four cream teas at the Church which this year will be held on the last two Sundays of July and the first two Sundays in August. Looks like the weather will be kind to us again, start time is 2.30pm to 5pm.

1.Apologies

Apologies received from Cllr Martin Round

2. Declarations

No lobbying was declared. There were no declarations of interest made to items on the agenda. There were no changes to the register of pecuniary Interests

3.Approval of the previous Minutes

The Chairman approved the APCM dated 13th May and accepted that the minutes were a true and accurate record and were signed accordingly.

4.Public Session

- 11 residents attended the meeting. The following items were brought to the attention of BMPC
 - The Malherbe Monthly paper edition had not been received for June/July (Boughton Park area).
 - . There was still a vacant post on the parish council.

The Chairman agreed to contact the Editor of the Malherbe Monthly regarding the newsletter.

The co-option process had been followed and the notice had been displayed for the required timeframe. The PC were now able to co-opt to the position and anyone interested in joining the PC should contact any member of the PC or clerk for further details, an advert will also be displayed in the Malherbe Monthly and on the pc website. Any interested applicants could then be considered at the next meeting (September).

5. External Reports

KCC -No report received

MBC

 Waste Collection- Cllr Trzebinski reported that Suez, the new waste contractor, is improving however there are still problems within rural areas with properties being missed off routes. The vehicles also have some issues whereby the food waste collection is filling up quicker on the new smaller vehicle whilst the back of the lorry is only half full, but the alarm in the cab means that the vehicles then have to return to the depot for the food waste to be emptied before returning to the round. This would then cause a knock-on delay. Cllr Trzebinski requested that if any residents are still having issues with collections to email him directly with their full address and postcode.

 Due to the local election being called and a number of councillors new to the role, it has been a quiet period at Maidstone Borough Council. The expectation was that the coalition would announce their plan for the next 4 years.

No other items were raised with Cllr Trzebinski

6. Review and Adopt (NALC) Finance Regulations

The NALC updated regulations had been circulated to members prior to the meeting for their consideration.

7. Approval of payments in accordance with the budget

A list of payments were circulated prior to the meeting. Members of the PC agreed that all payments should be made. BMPC **resolved** to make the outstanding 23/24 payment for Churchyard maintenance along with the 24/25 payment.

8. Amesis Agreement

BMPC authorised the clerk to submit the original draft contract to Amesis for approval. It was agreed that any negotiations would need to be brought back to the Parish Council for consideration or approval.

Action: Clerk

9. Create and Establish a Working Group for Boughton Malherbe Emergency Plan

Cllr Hook was appointed as Chairman for the working group. Cllr Hook was keen to call upon members of the community who wished to be involved in setting up an Emergency plan and those with relevant skills sets would be particularly welcome (Emergency service / first aiders). More information about the working group will be made available both online and in the Malherbe monthly but residents who would be willing to be involved were asked to contact the clerk in the first instance.

Action: Clerk to promote within the village.

10. Appoint KALC representatives

BMPC have the right to appoint two representatives to attend KALC meetings. There are normally 4 meetings a year. The chairman called for volunteers Cllr Hook and Cllr Tomlinson volunteered.

Action Clerk to advise KALC of the BMPC reps.

11. Review and Amend the Highway Improvement Plan

The current Highways Improvement plan had been issued to all members prior to the meeting for consideration. The PC authorised the clerk to make the changes suggested to the HIP plan and return them to KCC Highways. If, as a result of the changes, a meeting is required with the KCC steward, the clerk will advise members accordingly. A resident questioned if there were any financial outlay required by the PC if the red markings on the road were removed due to resurfacing. The chairman advised that it was the understanding of the PC that if the markings were to fade and erode due to wear and tear and we want it replaced, then Boughton Malherbe PC

would need to fund this if however, the markings were removed by either a utility company working on the road or Kent Highways resurfacing the road, then the markings would be replaced at no cost to the parish. A resident asked if a speed survey had been conducted in the parish. The chairman confirmed that previously KCC had completed one. Their finding concluded that there was not a speeding issue on the roads that had been monitored.

Action Clerk to amend HIP and return updated version to the KCC Steward

12. Arrangements for Community Litter Pick

It was agreed that Councillors will agree a date for the Community Litter Pick. Cllrs will then advise the clerk who will begin to advertise the event.

(Secretary's Note – Following the meeting, the 11th August has been confirmed as the date for the litter pick) The Chairman confirmed that Health and safety procedures for the event were being considered and would be in place for the event. Action: Clerk & Councillors to advertise litter pick.

13. Arrangements for potential Prescription Collection Service.

There was a discussion on the above item that had originated as an idea from a local residents' concerns about vulnerable members of the community and how the parish council and local residents could assist them with collection of items of shopping, prescriptions, doctors visits etc. The PC were in full support of this initiative although it was felt that further consideration into how it could look and be run would be required and in particular, someone in a coordinator role would be needed. Action: All Clirs to consider further, Clir Hook to promote amongst members of the Grafty Green Coffee Morning.

14. Bio Diversity Net Gain Training

The training was not attended, no report received.

15. Matters Arising

Cllr Tomlinson provided an update regarding the incident where a man driving a car had approached local woman whilst they were out walking and running. A number plate for the car had been provided to the local beat officer, who will look into this matter further. The message that the police are keen to get out is that if you feel uncomfortable or threatened or witness anything out of the ordinary, do report it. A safety message has been put on the local Facebook page.

The clerk raised the issue about the placement of the new rubbish bin which was procurred predominately for the disposal of waste collected during litter pick. The PC agreed to consider this outside of the meeting.

16. Exclude the Public

No matters for discussion.

There being no other matters the chairman thanked attendees and closed the meeting at 8:07pm.

Grafty Gourmet

Try this great Chinese dish with beef, mangetout & cashew nuts. A tasty dish that takes just 15 minutes to make.

Beef with Mangetout & Cashew Nuts

Ingredients

50g of unsalted cashew nuts

1 teaspoon of cornflour

1½ tablespoon of low-salt soy sauce

4 tablespoons of oyster sauce

1 tablespoon of rice vinegar

1 tablespoon of honey

1 tablespoon of sunflower or vegetable oil

280g of rump steak, thinly sliced

A thumb-sized piece of ginger, peeled and cut into matchsticks

2 garlic cloves, crushed

200g of mangetout, sliced in half on an angle

- 1. Toast the cashew nuts in a dry wok or frying pan, tossing, until browned. Tip onto a plate and set aside. Mix the cornflour with the soy sauce to make a paste, then add the oyster sauce, vinegar and honey. When you're ready to cook, have all the ingredients prepared and close to hand it will only take 5 mins.
- 2. Heat the wok until very hot. Add the oil, swirl it around to cover the base of the pan, then use tongs to place the steak pieces in the wok in a single layer. Cook without turning for 30 seconds to 1 minute, until a dark crust starts to form on the meat. Add the ginger and garlic, give everything a quick stir, then add the mangetout and the sauce. Cook for another 30 seconds to 1 minute until the beef is just cooked through and the sauce is thick and glossy. Sprinkle over the cashews and serve with rice or noodles.

Sue's nature notes

The Common Blue butterfly

The commonest of the blue butterflies found in sunny grassy places where there is also bird's foot trefoil, clover, yarrow and medicks, bugle, fleabane, kidney vetch, knapweed and thistles; they gather together in the evening and rest head downwards.

They have two broods a year; June to late July or mid-August to late April, the caterpillar overwintering in the base of plants.

An important update on our High Court Legal Challenge

In April, Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) adopted their new Local Plan. This included a site allocation for Heathlands and brought the 5,000 home Heathlands "new town" one step closer to destroying our village.

Working with a leading environmental law firm and with the generosity of local residents who donated to our fighting fund, we launched a High Court legal challenge seeking to get the decision to adopt the Local Plan quashed.

Our claim set out three grounds of challenge in relation to the plan's deliverability and also the education provision (or lack of) for the proposed Invicta Barracks site in Maidstone Town Centre. These were the three strongest grounds of challenge as advised by our Barrister.

We also made an application for a Cost Protection Order under the Aarhus convention to limit our exposure to costs at £10,000 in the event that our claim was unsuccessful.

High Court Judge, the Honourable Sir Peter Lane considered our case on 24th June. On review of our claim he decided to refuse permission to proceed.

This was always an expected step in the legal process and one we had been prepared for. The next expected stage would have been to request an oral hearing for our

Barrister to present further oral evidence to convince the Judge on the merits to proceed.

In considering the claim, the Judge also refused our Cost Protection Order. This was not an outcome we were expecting. We have subsequently submitted an objection on the costs decision to the High Court. We await the Judge's re-consideration in due course.

Without the Cost Protection Order in place, it leaves members of the SOHL Committee having to provide personal liability for unlimited costs which could run to tens of thousands of pounds. This is something we simply cannot sign up to do, irrespective of our determination to get Heathlands thrown out.

Regrettably, and after a lot of soul-searching, we have taken the difficult decision to no longer proceed with our claim. Although we were mindful that a challenge of this magnitude was always going to be difficult, we were hoping that we might have reached a more advanced stage of the process.

What this has brought in to sharp focus for us however is the colossal David vs Goliath nature of challenging public authorities and more specifically the Heathlands proposals which have cast an immense shadow over our rural village for the last five years.

As a small local residents' group simply trying to protect our local countryside and amenity, we have been faced with some of the biggest and most expensive Barristers in the legal system being loaded into the process to represent MBC, central Government and its associated arms-length bodies including Homes England.

The first stage of this process has accrued total costs by the aforementioned organisations of £27,900. Ironically, these Barristers are being paid for out of your local council and national taxes!

This update will likely come as disappointing news to you, as it has for us. We are determined however to make sure this is not the end of our challenge to the Maidstone Local Plan and the Heathlands proposals.

We will bring you an update on our next steps soon and we thank you for your unwavering support over the last five years and going forward.

Being present to others in a world of interruptions

As a father to 3 young children, I can testify to what people throughout history have discovered – that raising children is joyful, rewarding and a privilege. However, it also brings a whole new world of unpredictability! Having whatever I'm doing interrupted, by an amazingly broad range of requests, has become a standard part of life!

However, being interrupted is not unique to those who parent young children. Many of us are regularly interrupted by the next work demand, the ping of a phone notification or just by our own wondering attentions! There are ways that we can carefully cultivate interruption free times, but in most of life, interruption is par for the course.

It's in those moments that we sometimes see the worst of ourselves come out! How many of us have experienced a rush of impatience, frustration or even apathy when someone interrupts us with a need?

This is a universal challenge but in Jesus we see an amazing demonstration of being present and loving to others, even in the midst of interruption. Jesus had much to say and do, yet we still read numerous stories of him responding incredibly graciously to interruptions.


