An update from Katie Lam MP



Autumn is always a beautiful time in the Weald: orchards full of apples, and our vineyards and farms busy finishing the harvest. Just the other week, I managed to pick my own pears in Marden and to sample some lovely wine produced in Ham Street. It's a busy time of year, especially with Parliament returning, so I wanted to share a short update on what I've been doing, as well as what's coming up locally.

I recently met with Kent County Council's Transport Cabinet Member to share findings of my transport survey. I pressed

for fairer funding for Kent's roads, better resurfacing and pothole repairs, stronger enforcement on speeding and HGV routes, and protection for local bus services.

I want to update you all fully on what I found out, so over the next few weeks, every household in the Weald of Kent will receive a letter from me in the post. Inside, you'll find the results of the transport survey that so many of you completed earlier this year and a new survey on crime and policing.

As the nights draw in, many people worry more about safety: at home, on our high streets, on our roads — and even online. At a local business earlier this month, I heard about trailers and stock being stolen; sadly, it's a common problem, especially for many of our farmers. Rural areas like ours face different challenges to cities, and I want to make sure the voices of our small villages and towns are properly heard, and to see how I can best help.

This is your chance to tell me what's happening where you live. So, please do take a few minutes to fill in the survey when it arrives. Your answers will directly shape the questions I ask in Parliament and the work I do with Kent Police.

I hope everyone's wrapping up warm as winter approaches. It's a season that can bring its own challenges as well as moments of quiet reflection. It's a good time to take stock and think about how we can support one another and keep our communities connected. The cricket season finale at East Sutton

East Sutton is a small cricket ground nestled the Low Weald and as The Grafty Green Wanderers Team arrived the groundsman was rolling the perfectly prepared pitch.

The Grafty Green Growlers lined the boundary rope alongside the pavilion as David Chandler rested on the Five bar gate like a concerned Farmer reviewing his flock whilst Carol perched like a Secretary bird on her seat, pencil in hand and the scorebook open. James lles won the toss and decided to bat... game on.

The East Sutton groundsman turned out to be their opening fast bowler and the wicket was very much to his liking, moving ball and causing problems to the Wanderers opening batsman of Jack "The Prof" Geary and Jay "Amiga Man" Bray..

In the 6th over "The Prof" decided to have a go at a slower paced delivery, he failed to connect and his stumps were duly removed by the ball.

With the score at 21-1 Josh "Panks" entering the batting until in the 8th over when in total disbelief "Amiga Man" saw all his stumps removed by an outstanding delivery which moved about 2ft outside off stump!

"Panks" then took the bull by the horns and hitting 3 straight boundaries to start to get the scoreboard moving.

Over the next 17 overs he amassed a total of 71 runs including 14 boundaries and two sixes, he was supported by a string of 6 batting partners who just couldn't find a way to deal with the bowling attack before "Panks" finally fell to a catch by the Eastwood Sutton fielder leaving the Wanderers at 130 for 9.

The wanderers final two batsmen put in the last few runs and The Wanderers ended their innings on 134 all out off 27 overs.

East Sutton took the field and steady moved the score along to 25 until two quick wickets were taken by both Gary "Grey by Night "Thompson and Mark "The Essex Swinger "Tomlinson leaving East Sutton at 33 for 2.

"Amiga Man" and Paul" The Brickie "Stapley then joined the Bowling attack with both Bowlers taking 2 wickets each in successive overs to leave East Sutton at 58 for 6 in the 13th over.

The Wanderers fielding had been magnificent with every player putting their bodies on the line to reduce the boundaries with "The Essex Swinger" taking a ball in the goolies and suffering a severe groin strain whilst "Dangerous Dave" dazzled on the leg side boundary.

The Growlers were fixed on "Amiga Man" who run like a man a third his age in front of them, maybe this was the eye candy they had been looking for all season.

"The Essex swinger" returned to get another wicket and the match was in the balance at 69 for 7 as drinks were taken.

The Wanderers knew that East Sutton had kept back a couple of really good batsman so it was all set up for a grandstand finale.

The match recommenced, a lovely ball from "Baby Face "caught the batsman off guard and the ball looped tantalising towards Nick "The Chairman "Eastwood, it hung in the air for an age as all the Wanderers fixed their gaze on "The Chairman".

The ball seemed to bounce from hand to hand as if he was juggling with it and with one last grasp for the ball, his hand found air and the ball hit the ground and the relief was clear to see on the batsman's face.

"Baby face "then delivered a fabulous ball which struck the Batsman pads plumb in front of the wicket. The umpire immediately raised his finger, the batsman left the field after scoring 22 and East Sutton were 116 for 8 off 22 overs needing 19 to win with two wickets remaining.

" Amiga Man " was called back into the bowling attack and in his last over of the day delivered a fantastic ball which sent the stumps flying.

East Sutton were now 130 for 9 as the last man took the field to face "Baby Face", it was going to the wire but it wasn't going to be the Wanderers day. East Sutton managed to grab 5 runs off the over to win the match at 135 for 9.

The players left the field to the raucous appreciation of The Growlers and an Invite from East Sutton to return next season.

The Wanderers man of the match went to "Panks" with a marvellous innings of 71 runs.



The Grafty Gourmet

Bacon-wrapped sausages cooked in a sherry-laced, onion-rich sauce make this French onion sausage casserole a quick and easy dinner to warm you up on these cold nights.

FRENCH ONION & SAUSAGE CASSEROLE

6 rashers of streaky bacon
375g pack of pork chipolatas
Vegetable oil for frying
25g of butter
500g of onions, sliced
2 garlic cloves, sliced
1 tablespoon of plain flour
100ml of medium dry or dry sherry, plus an extra splash
1 beef stock pot
3-4 bushy fresh thyme sprigs, plus extra leaves to garnish
8 large thin slices of fresh baguette or similar crusty bread
4 teaspoons of wholegrain mustard
125g of strong cheddar cheese, grated
Splash sherry vinegar

- 1. Cut the bacon rashers in half, stretch each piece by running the back of a kitchen knife blade along it, then wrap one around each chipolata. Heat the oil in a medium hob-safe casserole dish, add the pigs in blankets and brown over a medium-high heat for 4-5 minutes. Set aside.
- 2. Add a splash more oil if needed, along with the butter, then add the onions and a plenty of salt and black pepper. Fry gently for 5-6 minutes until starting to soften. Stir in the garlic, then cover and simmer for 15 minutes, stirring once or twice, until the onions have softened and turned deep brown. Stir the flour into the onions, then cook for 1-2 minutes. Add the sherry, stock pot and 500ml hot water from a just-boiled kettle. Stir to combine, then add the browned pigs in blankets and the thyme
- 3. Simmer on a low-medium heat for 20 minutes until it thickens. Meanwhile, heat the grill to high. Toast the baguette slices on each side. Spread with the mustard, then scatter with the grated cheese. Cook under the hot grill until the cheese has melted and is bubbling and golden. Stir a splash more sherry and the sherry vinegar into the casserole, season to taste, then serve with the cheese toasts, and extra thyme leaves, if you like.

Gardening tips for November

- Frost and cold weather seem to arrive later each year. Keep an eye on the weather forecast.
- Protect tender plants from frost. Lift and move to greenhouse or wrap fleece around plants in situ.
- Lift dahlias (or mulch heavily) once blackened by frost.
- Continue to tidy borders for winter, cutting back dead foliage (leaving seed heads which look decorative and for birds and insects to eat.
- > Mulch any cleared areas with compost.
- Dig out perennial weeds.
- Lift and divide overcrowded perennials.
- Plant bare root fruit trees and bushes, hedges and roses.
- > Shorten hybrid tea roses and floribundas to reduce damage from wind rock.
- Prune climbing roses.
- Plant tulip bulbs in containers and beds.
- Continue to collect leaves, add to compost or make leaf mold.

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

Christian Message

Focus on November

"The pen is mightier than the sword" is a saying that many will recognise. It is attributed to Edward Bulwer-Lytton from 1839. However, its origins go back much further. In the fifth century BCE the Greek writer, Euripides, wrote "The tongue is mightier than the blade". And even further back in the seventh century BCE the Assyrian, Ahigar wrote "The word is mightier than the sword".

There is, perhaps, a development in these sayings in that in ancient times the written word was available to only a few people, it was the spoken word that transmitted ideas. Whereas by the nineteenth century books and pamphlets were widely available. Now, of course we have "social media" and it seems that is the popular medium for discussion of ideas.

There is no doubt that words are powerful, however they are transmitted. They can affirm and they can criticise, they can build up and they can break down. They can transmit truth, and they can tell lies.

When I was young, I was given good advice that I should never say behind someone's back what I would not say to their face. It seems even more relevant today that we should not "post" comments on-line that we would not say to a person's face, and we should remember the commandment not to tell lies.

The new developments in technology mean that we can transmit information and ideas incredibly quickly. The temptation can be to press "send" before we check what we have typed. Is it true? How will it be received? Often the messages I receive show that they have not even been read back, there are so many typos present.

If Jesus were in human form today, would he use social media to reach people with his message? I am not sure he would, much of what appears on the internet and particularly on social media has become untrustworthy through misuse, the telling of lies and unsubstantiated claims.

We must take care with the words we use and how we use them. For most people the message of Jesus is most strongly conveyed between people when it is told face to face. The words of Jesus were told to only a relatively few people during his life on earth. Over the next one hundred years or so they were recorded by pen and ink. Over the next two thousand years the words of Jesus have been studied by scholars and ordinary people, and they have changed the world.


